waited on, pursuant to the Order of Yesterday, to know when he would be pleased to be attended by this House; had been pleased to appoint Monday, at One o'Clock, at the Government House.

On Motion of Mr. Pyke, refolved, that a Committee be appointed, to wait on his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to know whether any, and what steps, have been taken by the Attorney General, on the subject of Francis Green's Petition, pursuant to the Resolution, and request of this House, to his Excellency, in the last Session.

Ordered, That Mr. Tonge, Mr. Sterns, and Mr. McMonagle, be a Committee, for the above purpose.

Then the House adjourned until Monday at One o'Clock.

Ordered, That Mr. Sterns, Mr. Campbell, and Mr. Pyke, be a Committee, to prepare and bring in a Bill accordingly.
