Some Damage to Moulding Shop In Fire Last Evening—Man Found Unconscious in Building. (From Wednesday's Daily.) Fire about 8.30 last night was noticed in the moulding shop of the Belleville Hardware Company and before it was extinguished a considerable amount of damage was done. The blaze apparently started from the vicinity of the cupola. During moulding sparks fly in all directions and it is thought one of them may have got in the roof and smouldered for some hours before it broke out. Once it had become a blaze, the fire was not long in spreading, running along the ascending roof into the space between the rafters. There the most of the damage was done to the woodwork. The flames were prevented from invading the machine shops. The fire was out at ten o'clock. This morning the plant was not in operation, but the damage can soon be repaired. The loss is covered by insurance. During the fire, the firemen and police heard a man groaning within the building and going inside, found an unknown man lying on clay and in water beneath the burning building. He was unconscious and was taken to the office and thence on Dr. Dolan's advice to the hospital. At half an hour after midnight he was rushed easily. It is thought he rushed in with a crowd of citizens at the start of the fire and was overcome with smoke. One of the firemen had warned one man who was in the way not to go in, and this may have been the man who was found inside.
