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THRONGS PAY LAST TRIBUTE TO MEMORY OF REV. DR. DYER

An impressive tribute to the memory of the late Rev. William P. Dyer, M.A., B.Sc., D.D., former principal of Albert College, was paid this afternoon when ministers of the Bay of Quinte Methodist conference, the board, faculty and students of Albert College, college associates and citizens assembled at the Tabernacle Methodist Church for the funeral and memorial services. The remains had arrived at noon by train and were taken to the church where they lay in state.

The Rev. W. P. Rogers, B.A., of Napanee, president of the conference was in charge of the service. Associated with him were Rev. Dr. Baker, his successor at Albert College, Rev. Dr. S. Cleaver, Rev. George Brown, Rev. W. G. Clarke, Rev. Wesley Elliott and Rev. H. B. Kenney who spoke in eulogy of the private life of the departed, his work as teacher, educationist and as minister of the Christian church.

The bearers were members of the family, James Dyer, William S. Dyer and Albert E. ("Ted") Dyer, sons, James H. Dyer and E. V. Dyer, brothers and Dr. T. W. Dawson, son-in-law. Honorary pall bearers were four ministerial friends of the late Principal Dyer and Prof. V. P. Hunt, Mr. J. E. Walmaley.

The interment was made in the family plot in Belleville cemetery by the side of those of the late Mrs. Dyer.

On Wednesday afternoon service was held at the home of his daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) T. W. Dawson, Laurier Ave., Toronto by Rev. T. W. Neil, President of the Toronto Methodist Conference, who was a former student under Dr. Dyer. Prior to his passing into the Great Beyond, Dr. Dyer made the request that Rev. Mr. Neil conduct the service.

Mr. F. E. O'Flynn today paid tribute to the memory of the late ex-principal in the following words:

"I have known the Rev. W. P. Dyer since 1874 when we attended Albert College together. He was a man of gentle disposition, rather

quiet in his manner but exceedingly lovable. In later years when he became principal of Albert College, as a member of the executive, as solicitor for the college and latterly as bursar, I had an intimate association with him. "His life was wrapped up in Albert College and he piloted it successfully through troubled and trying times with the assistance of my late father, E. D. O'Flynn, the late L. W. Yeomans, the late Henry Pringle, the late Rev. Amos Campbell, J. E. Walmaley, Esq., and other loyal friends of the college. Our association for many years has been of the most intimate kind, in summer camp, in business and church relations and I have only the pleasantest memories and the highest regard for him. I am sure that thousands of young men and young women in our Canadian homes throughout the Dominion will revere his memory while life shall last.

"Dr. Dyer was obliged to retire from the principalship of Albert College through ill-health and since then has visited the city only at intervals. His friends have missed him since he left but his death recalls to our minds a good citizen, an able administrator, a faithful Christian and a gentleman and no doubt as long as new Albert College lasts some memorial will recall to the future generations, his splendid services as principal of Albert College, and as a minister of the Methodist Church."

"In the passing of Rev. Dr. Dyer, who was principal of Albert College for over 25 years, the church loses a strong and useful man." The Rev. Wesley Elliott, chairman of the Belleville Methodist district stated. "The many men now in the ministry of the Methodist Church came under his splendid influence as they took their course of study in Albert College and their lives have been made richer by this influence. Many others as well who have attended Albert are better for having known this noble man of God. Dr. Dyer, though dead, speaks through a multitude of lives that he has blessed."

NEVER-ENDING CROWDS HONOR UNKNOWN POILU

Since Nov. 11, 1920 When Burial Took Place Under Arc de Triomphe Flowers and People Found There.

PARIS, March 26.—Flowers are brought by an unceasing pilgrimage of mourners and placed on the slab that marks the grave of the unidentified French soldier under the great Arch of Triumph that dominates the western part of the city. The pile of flowers and wreaths is fed with fresh contributions from early morning until late at night. There seems no end to the little ceremonies by organizations held at the grave to honor the war dead. Little shop girls bring small bunches of violets that cost 50 centimes; statesmen passing through Paris place their great wreaths as tributes from their countries.

Since November 11, 1920, when the unknown soldier was placed under the arch, there has always been a group or crowd of mourners at the shrine of the dead. There has always been a huge pile of flowers. On Sundays, thousands stream there from the twelve avenues that converge at the Etoile, as the circular open space surrounding the arch is called and there is a procession of people with bare heads passing by the mound of flowers.

Many teachers bring their classes and there is a movement about to arrange that in each of the public schools of Paris a small contribution shall be collected on a separate day in each school to buy flowers to be placed on the slab by a delegation of honor pupils, so that there may be such a tribute of the children of France to the war dead every day of the year.

MAGISTRATE DISMISSES CHARGE; ALL YOUNG MEN ACCUSED, FREE

The inevitable aftermath of Sunday night's trouble on Mill street came today when Frank Cleveland, Charles Cleveland, Percy Cleveland, Charles Lucas, Stanley Lucas and John Way were charged to justice with having used grossly insulting language to Mrs. Lola Staley.

Chief Kidd conducted the examination of the witnesses on behalf of the prosecution and Mr. W. C. Mikel, K.C., defended the young men. Mrs. Lola Staley testified that she had been standing at the home of her father, 73 Mt. Street, and that on Sunday night Frank Cleveland, Charles Cleveland, Stanley Lucas, Charles Lucas and John Way came asking for her husband, Richard Staley. She informed him that he was not at home. They began to "chew the rag," curse and swear. They called him (Staley) a vile name and said that he had to take back what he was alleged to have said or suffer a trimming. She ordered them away twice but they did not go. The two Clevelands did more of the talking and took off their coats. Mr. Amos Keller was at the house at the time and some of the talk was directed toward him.

To Mr. Mikel witnesses said that Amos Keller and William Godfrey had come to the house and in about five minutes the others came up. Keller did not say that they had come to see if Richard Staley had started a report. Percy Cleveland was not at the door at all. George Keller, who was sitting in the dining room, heard the vile language but could not say by whom it was uttered. William Godfrey heard the cursing but could not identify any one as having used it, although all but Percy Cleveland were there. Charles Cleveland took off his coat and said Dick Staley had to take back what he said or take a licking.

Amos Keller wearing a discolored eye from another fracas the same night told of the swearing. Frank and Charles Cleveland were those who did most of the swearing. Amy denied swearing himself and said Mrs. Staley did not swear. After hearing the defendants Mr. Masson dismissed the charge against all the young men.
