Washington, Feb. 1.—Customs Collector Hamilton at Norfolk, reported to the Treasury that the German prize steamer Appam, which came into Hampton Roads this morning has prisoners of war aboard. His report was referred at once to the State Department which will determine the status of the vessel.

The Appam brought her original passengers and 138 persons said to have been taken from other vessels by the Germans. Four injured passengers on board are said to have been taken from an English ship from Australia. About 425 persons, including passengers and crew are aboard the ship.

Chief Constable, Brantford: Dear Sir,—Am enclosing herewith a copy of an anonymous letter received by this department regarding a girl named Dolores Evans, who was strangled to death in a room in the Perry Hotel this city, on the 11th instant, by an Italian named Lewis Bianchetti, now in our custody. The letter was postmarked Cleveland, Ohio, and says the victim is Bertha Harsh of your city. While we usually do not pay any attention to missives of this kind, I would appreciate any effort you may make to verify the source of information as the dead girl has not been positively identified as yet in spite of our efforts and the fact that her body was viewed
