A new method of electro-plating upon glass, porcelain, etc., which is said to give very good results, is the invention of an Italian engineer, who obtains an adherent deposit of different metals on such surfaces. In the first place, the surface of the glass is first place, the surface of the glass is roughened in the sand blast; then it is covered with a paste made with hydrofuuoric acid and a chloride or other salt of the metal which is to be deposited on the surface. Then the object is put in an electro-plating bath in order to receive a coating of the metal. he metal.
