Count Tisza, the Hungarian Premier, is commencing to speak out in "meetings." As is well known, the Hungarians are not overly friendly with the Austrians, and from time to time the junior partner of the Dual monarchy has complained about the way in which they were forced to do the heavy fighting. Count Tisza now complains that the price of food is raising to an exorbitant figure and wants to know what his Imperial master Emperor Franz Joseph is going to do about it. The Magyar Premier states that Austria-Hungary has not sufficient cereals to support both the Army and the people, but is afraid to let the people know how serious the situation is. It is just possible that when the economic pressure becomes a little more acute the dissatisfaction already expressed by the Hungarians will culminate in open opposition to the Austrian ends of the Alliance. Tisza is regarded as the ablest statesman in Austria-Hungary.

Under Prohibition. By Special Wire to the Courier. Halifax, Feb. 23.—At the sitting of the House of Assembly yesterday, Howard W. Corbett, Conservative member for Yarmouth, introduced a bill to extend the provisions of the Nova Scotia temperance act so as to bring the city of Halifax also under prohibition.

A new method of electro-plating upon glass, porcelain, etc., which is said to give very good results, is the invention of an Italian engineer, who obtains an adherent deposit of different metals on such surfaces. In the first place, the surface of the glass is roughened in the sand blast; then it is covered with a paste made with hydrofluoric acid and a chloride or other salt of the metal which is to be deposited on the surface. Then the object is put in an electro-plating bath in order to receive a coating of the metal.

GERMANS MAKING TREMENDOUS GAINS WITH VERDUN FORTRESS

Crown Prince, With an Army of Against French Positions and a Width of Ten Miles to a Depth Drive Probably is Checked by N

London, Feb. 24.—Nominally led by the Crown Prince, 280,000 Germans are attacking the French on a front of twenty-five miles in a colossal smash for the great fortress of Verdun.

They have broken through the French lines on a front of ten miles to a depth of nearly two miles to points within eight miles of the fortress, but it is thought that they can now be held in check. The village of Haumont is in German hands.

The French are inflicting heavy losses on the attacking troops, and have regained some ground. The battle has far rapidly developed into the greatest of the war.

French and British view it as the last tremendous effort of the Germans, which, if it fails, will condemn them to a shackled defensive on every front.

A terrific artillery duel is proceeding on the 25 mile stretch between Haumont and the region in front of Etain. The great German guns are keeping up an unintermitted bombardment with shells of great calibre. The French, in reply, are unchaining hurricanes of lead and iron.

Further Gains, Cl No Broken Line,

German Official Names Several Places Captured Near Verdun.

By Special Wire to the Courier. Berlin, Feb. 24, via London.—Further gains for the Germans in the region north of the French fortress of Verdun were reported by the war office today. The statement says the entire wooded district northwest and northeast of Beaumont and the forest of Haye are in possession of the Germans.

"Announced" today was made of the capture by the Germans of the villages of Brabant, Haumont and Samogneux, in the Verdun region.

The statement follows: "Western front: The success we obtained east of the Meuse has been exploited further. The villages of Brabant, Haumont and Samogneux have been captured. The entire wooded districts northwest, north and northeast of Beaumont and the forest of Haye are in our possession.

"South of Metz an advanced French post was taken by a surprise attack and the entire garrison of fifty men were captured.

"Balkan front: There is nothing to report."

TRAIN WRECK ON QUEBEC CENTRAL LINE

One Killed, Three Badly Scalded, in the Mix-up.

Quebec, Feb. 24.—One man is dead, three others are badly scalded following the derailment, at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon of the Quebec Central train near St. Georges, Beauce. The dead man is D. Ross, the engineer of the train, of Sherbrooke, who was taken to the Hotel Dieu Hospital in Sherbrooke last night, where he died early this morning.

One of the injured men is P. Murray, the freeman on the wrecked train of Sherbrooke, and is lying at the Hotel Dieu Hospital in Sherbrooke, from
