THE SITUATION

The demand for reprisals in connection with German air raids upon the Old Country, is evidently going to bear fruit. Over The Courier leased wire to-day there comes the statement that Lloyd George, after visiting a devastated area, exclaimed, "We will give it all back to them and we will give it to them soon. We shall bomb Germany with compound interest." It is to be hoped that this will prove to be the case, for in no other way apparently, can the aerial murderers be taught a much needed lesson.

Haig's gunners continue to smash the foe East of Ypres, and they are badly damaging his defences. The British are making a desperate effort to seize desirable positions before the rainy season and the winter sets in, and the Germans are just as desperately endeavoring to defeat that object.

The story of bitter conflict still continues with regard to the Verdun region. The foe yesterday, reached the French lines, and occupied a small part of them, but has since been almost entirely driven out, suffering very heavy losses.

From East Africa there comes the report of good progress on the part of British columns against stubborn resistance, and in a very difficult country.

British airmen continue to do notable work and the official statement has been issued, "In the air-raid of the last eight days all of our pilots have landed safely." During August it is estimated that 125 tons of bombs were dropped on the foe.

The statement is made that as the result of the successful operations of the British against the Turks in Mesopotamia, some four thousand prisoners have been taken.

EXPORT EMBARGO
WILL HIT GERMANY
Enemy's Military Power
Slowly Being Killed by
Allied Pressure.

Washington, Oct. 3.—Great Britain's new embargo on shipments of practically everything to Sweden, Norway, Denmark and the Netherlands is regarded here as a most important move in tightening the cord on which slavery, but surely is killing the military power of Germany. Coming close on the export embargo of the United States, which is being administered to keep from the European neutrals everything that might supply the Central Powers, Great Britain's action is regarded as one of the most important of the war. As the British embargo excludes everything except printed matter, about the only thing that will be permitted to go to the German people by way of the neutrals will be expressions of world opinion that they should reorganize their system of government to do away with the military autocracy.

In a figurative sense, Great Britain holds one end of the rope and the United States holds the other. Gradually, but surely, as it is being drawn taut, the military power of Germany is being strangled because the embargo cuts off the supplies she has been receiving through the adjacent neutrals.

JAPAN AND AMERICA
ARE LINKED IN UNION

Their Entente Will Hasten
World's Deliverance From
German Menace.

London, Oct. 3.—The address made in New York last week by Viscount Ishii, head of the Japanese mission to the United States, The Times, in a leading editorial on "America and Japan," says, "as a result, 'as unforeseen by Germany as it is, an unwelcome of years of intrigue on both sides of the Pacific, which she has spent in a vain effort to arouse enmity between the United States and Japan.' The Times adds that a close union between the two great Pacific powers, to which the reception of the Ishii mission gives new strength and new significance, will both hasten the deliverance of the world from the German menace and prepare for future peace in the Far East.

"For both reasons," it says, "it is welcome to the Allies and doubly welcome to England, whose interest in the tranquility and welfare of these regions is so profound."

DEVELOPMENTS SOON.

Word from Ottawa tells of the arrival of many men, prominent in public life, including Liberals, and it is rumored that Cabinet changes may be announced by the end of the week on a union basis.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has returned to the Capital after a party consultation in Montreal. It is announced that early next week he will be in Toronto for a conference with his Ontario supporters. It is also said that he will shortly issue another public statement.

ROOSEVELT ON THE WAR
ISSUE.

Roosevelt is an ex-President but he isn't ex anything else. The fact that he continues to hold immense and unique power over his fellow citizens receives almost daily exemplification and in relation to the war he has occupied in many respects the foremost place. He was urging American participation while Wilson was still writing notes, and when the final break did come his offer to raise a force which he would take to France did more to stir the nation than probably any other agency.

He has been making many addresses and at all of them the enthusiasm has been most marked. One such recently held in Kansas City will serve as a sample. The event took place in the "Electric Park" of that city and an audience of twenty thousand filled the amphitheater while it is estimated that at least twenty thousand more were outside.

The most remarkable feature of the night was the manner in which the immense audience listened to Colonel Roosevelt's message.

At first there had been much confusion, hoarse cries from men and boys in the rear of the crowd, and loud voiced demands for those standing in the aisles to sit down. This was when Mayor George H. Edwards attempted to introduce the colonel. Fully fifteen minutes the mayor waited for quiet. It did not come, and he went ahead with his brief word of introduction.

Then Colonel Roosevelt stepped to the edge of the platform and lifted high his arms. Almost in an instant a great quiet rested over the thousands. For more than an hour he spoke. And always the crowd listened closely, breaking into applause now and then, but for the most part content to hear the plea of red-blooded Americanism and real national preparedness from the lips of the man who is "going to do all his power to back up the men who are going to fight."

Here are some extracts from the vigorous address which he delivered:

"We have gone to war for the honor and welfare of our people and because we have to make good our promise we stand for liberty, or ever after hold our peace."

"I would have fought at the drop of the hat after the sinking of the Lusitania. A nation which won't fight to protect its unarmed men, women and children is not worth calling a nation."

"The only way to overcome any antagonist is by hitting."

"We are fighting for America, for the United States, but we are also fighting for the rest of mankind, for the right of every liberty loving nation which does not wrong its neighbors."

"At this time every vigorous young man of fighting age ought to be with the colors if he can possibly get there. It will be a mighty good thing in the future to explain to your children and grandchildren why you did go to the war, and not to have to explain why you didn't go."

"Any American of ordinary intelligence who does not now oppose Germany with heart and soul is either a traitor or a coward. And the worst evil that could now befall the world would be an inconclusive peace. Such a peace would be accepted everywhere as a German victory."

"If at this moment, while we are still helpless, France and England were defeated, the German fleet would be at our doors in a fortnight, and an army of conquest would have landed here within a month."

"As for the talk about this war being a rich man's war, waged for commercial reasons, it is as dishonest nonsense as ever was uttered."

"Let us adopt as the permanent policy of this country the policy of universal obligatory military training. If a man is not willing to fight for the country then he is not fit to be a citizen."
