

WAR MEASURES ACT MAY BE ENFORCED

Steamfitters' Union Said to be Delaying Construction of Ships

Toronto, Sept. 20.—The Dominion Government has not up to the present time exercised the drastic powers it has made under the War Measures Act, to enforce compliance with the provisions requiring all adults to engage in some useful occupation during the period of the war, nor to compel artisans and others to refrain from going out on strike, thereby delaying or dislocating work of national importance.

REVOLUTION IS NEAR IN GERMANY

Hindenburg or Ludendorff May Become Imperial Chancellor

London, Sept. 19.—Political developments in the Central Empires consequent upon the rejection of the Austrian peace note are awaited with profound interest, for there are new and important elements in the situation. In the present crisis the newspapers, both German and Austrian, like the Vorwaertz and the Arbeiter Zeitung, are plainly telling their readers that the military autocracy of the Central Empires constitutes the real obstacle to peace, and they note the alleged desire of the Entente and of America not to destroy the German people through great conquest.
