BOER VISITORS.

The Boer delegates who are making a tour of Canada studying Canadian agricultural methods, arrived in Kentville on Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock from Wolfville.

The visitors were Mr. and Mrs. Moody Lane, of Blackstaple, H. F. Rood of Pretoria and Mr. and Mrs. Joorte. They are being accompanied through Canada by Capt. H. J. and Mrs. Kirkpatrick, of Pretoria, and by W. W. Moore, of the agricultural department, Ottawa, President Bigelow, of Wolfville, and Col. Blair, of Truro, accompanied them from Wolfville.

They were guests of the Aberdeen Hotel and were met by the Mayor, Town Council and a delegation from the Board of Trade and also a few prominent farmers. Mr. M. G. DeWolf was present and presented each lady with a beautiful bunch of Sweet Peas. As Mrs. Kirkpatrick is a lady he presented her with a bunch of pure white ones.

Those who were in conversation with the visitors found them most affable and highly delighted with what they had seen of Canada. The woods and beautiful streams were of much interest to them, as such as is found in Canada is not seen in their country.

They will be in Canada about two months, after which they will return to their own country filled with valuable information in regards farming etc., far advanced of their methods.

Messrs. Joorte and Moody Lane, are wealthy men owning fifteen large farms. The latter is an Irishman who went to the Transvaal, thirty years ago. Mr. Rood, of Pretoria, is a young man, a son of an immensely wealthy Boer. All three men fought through the war, either until it ended, or until captured. Mr. Lane and Mr. Joorte, were amongst those of Cronje's soldiers who surrendered after the gallant night attack by the First Canadian Contingent at Paardeberg.
