SASKATOON CELEBRATES

People of Saskatoon Simply Went Crazy When the Location of the University Was Announced—Bang Bells and Built Bon-fires in Every Ward.

Saskatoon, April 7.—This city simply went crazy tonight when the news was flashed from Regina that the university of Saskatchewan would be located here. Up to a few days ago the citizens had explicit confidence in the outcome, but news reached here yesterday which made the people rather skeptical. On the receipt of the news tonight, however, the joy of Saskatoonians knew no bounds and they started in to celebrate. At one o'clock bon-fires are burning in every part of the city, bells are ringing and whistles blowing, and everywhere is general jubilation, numerous citizens appearing on the streets in somewhat scanty attire.

The location of the university here means more to this city than any other place in Saskatchewan. Saskatoon has just reached "that stage of its career when a verdict for or against on this matter had the making of otherwise of the city, and the happy culmination which results in placing the university is taken as a positive indication that Saskatoon will become the largest centre in this province. Great credit is extended on all sides to the two local governors, James Clinckskill and W. J. Bell, and to Hon. A. P. McNab, minister of public works, for the untiring energy which has resulted in the securing of the plum for Saskatoon.

Death of Mrs. Spence.

The death occurred at the Victoria hospital on Sunday of Bertha S. Brotherton, wife of Thomas Spence, a well known farmer living a few miles south of Regina.

On April 1st, Mrs. Spence gave birth to a daughter from the effects of which she has never fully recovered.

The funeral was held yesterday from the Res. St. Methodist church. Deceased was in her fortieth year and was highly respected among her large circle of friends.

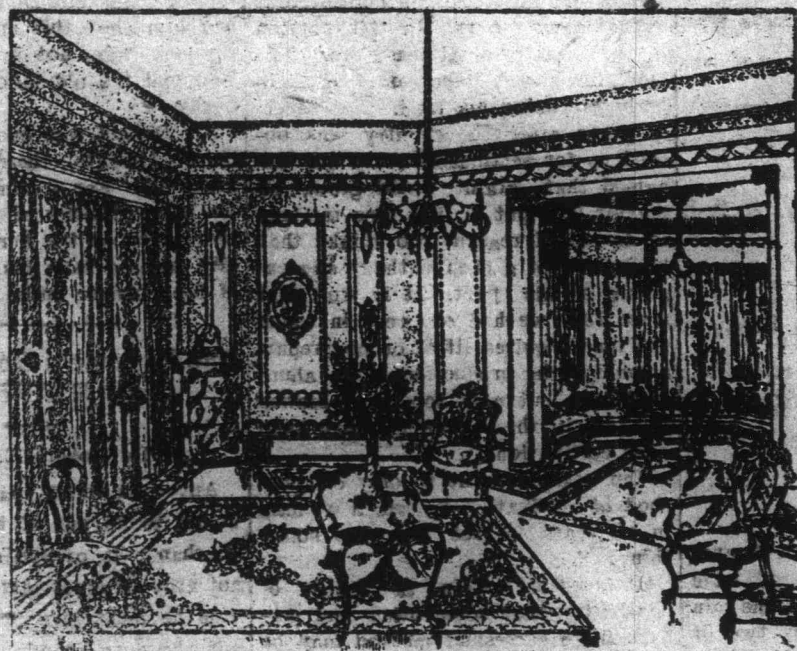

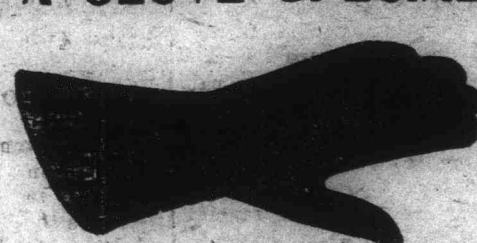

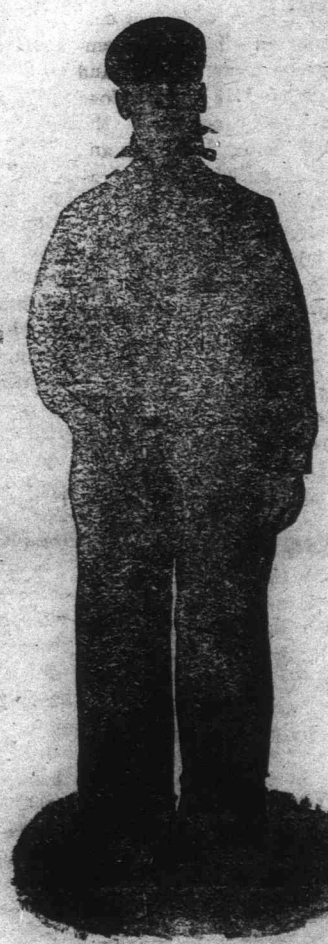
