TO-DAY'S LATEST.

BRITISH REVERSES.

London, Oct. 3.—The following despatch has been received from Roberts: Pretoria, Tuesday, Oct. 2.—A convoy of 22 wagons, escorted by 60 mounted men, was attacked by 140 Boers Oct. 1, near De Jagers drift, while on the way to Vryheid. Twelve of the men escaped. The fate of the others is not known. The Boers derailed a train near Paarl yesterday evening. Five Coldstream Guards were killed and 19 injured. Commandant Dirksen, who has been opposing Paarl, has surrendered, after a personal visit to Komatipoort, to assure himself that Kruger had gone into Portuguese territory.

KRUGER'S GREEN SASH.

New York, Oct. 3.—A despatch to the Journal from Lorenzo Marquez, says: The restrictions around Mr. Kruger are increasing and he is virtually a prisoner. He had been allowed to use the use of the Portuguese governor's carriage. While driving yesterday he met a party of burghers and made them a patriotic speech. The governor has now refused the use of his carriage. Kruger has been warned to make no more speeches, and is forbidden to wear the green sash which is the insignia of his office. Kruger expects to sail on a Dutch cruiser for Holland next week.

MATE ROSS' BODY FOUND.

The body of the last of the Martin wreck victims, at Port Huron, was recovered from the water, being found floating in the river below St. Clair. It was identified as that of Mate Wm. Ross. Mate Ross, hailed from this section of the country. His mother is a widow, and resides near Northwood, about five miles east of Chatham. An sister of Charles Hicklin, foreman of the Planet press room, is married to John Ross, a brother of the mate of the ill-fated boat.

BOERS STILL ACTIVE.

They Make a Raid and Capture a Convoy—Buller Coming Home.

London, Oct. 3.—"Sir Redvers Buller," says the Daily Mail's correspondent at Pietermaritzburg, "will return to England, I hear, with Lord Roberts, and Lord Kitchener will remain in the chief command in South Africa."

A Durban despatch says:—In consequence of the Boers capturing a convoy of Natal volunteers between De Jager's Ditch and Blood River burning several wagons and capturing the escort, the intended home-going of the Natal volunteers has been indefinitely postponed. This has caused a painful impression throughout the colony.

SHARPE HAS GONE.

When Henry Sharpe's name was called by Officer Deane at this morning's police court session there was no response and Judge Houston acquiesced in the request of the crown attorney for the arresting of his bail of \$200 and the issue of a warrant for his arrest. On Friday last Sharpe and Frank Shea were apprehended on the information of Henry Lawrence, charging them with the larceny of \$7.50 by means of gaming with loaded dice. Shea was on hand but, owing to the non-appearance of Sharpe, he was merely arraigned, pleaded not guilty, elected to be tried summarily and was released on his own recognizance to appear as such time at his fellow defendant is secured.
