Planet Scribes Travel

And Pen Their Experiences For The
Readers of This Journal

WILD AND WOOLLY WEST

R. S. Smyth Describes its Many
Distinctive Features.

Rapid Development in Every Respect is
Noted—An old Chatham boy
Doing Well

Dear Planet,—have you room? or can you make room, for a short gist of chat from this section of the wild and woolly West? Thanks! Here goes. Let me say, as a starter, that this particular part of the West is not the wild-eyed affair most easterners suppose it. They see in their dreams, perhaps, or in their recollections of early western trips, a great unending stretch of rolling prairie, unbroken by anything but an occasional herd of grazing, lowing kine, coyotes howling diabolically in the background, and all that sort of thing. But, in so far as the Pincher Creek district is concerned, they must guess again. Last year I rode across country thirty miles from Pincher Creek, to southward, and travelled in a nearly straight line. There were the ranchers here and there, and nothing else. Now, however, the scene is changed. Farmers are flocking in to the supreme disgust of the rancher—and nearly all the available land within twenty-five miles of the town, to the south, is taken up in quarters, halves and sections. Much of it is fenced, the balance will soon be. Houses are springing up everywhere. Taking a survey from the top of a high knoll, I counted fifteen houses in sight, but not one of them being finished. From this your readers can form some slight idea of the present rate of settlement.

The fencing, as a matter of course, destroys the range, and the small rancher must move, and move quickly. There are some who consider removing even to the Peace River in the hope of being left alone for a few years. The man who would come west now to take up ranching on a small scale, must seek a location in the farther north. So far as this district is concerned, farming is the order of the day; and, to ranch here now, the settler must be prepared to buy much land, as there is virtually no open range. Otherwise he must cultivate the acquaintance of the dairy cow, buy a cream separator, and sell eggs.

I was near the Kootenai lake last week. The near view of the mountains, was a relief after so much of the prairie for so long, but my desire to visit this charming body of water nestling like a jewel in the rugged mountain pass, gave way before the prospect of canny-like mosquitoes and swarms of "bull-dogs." Six miles from the lake these pests were bad enough, and I ventured no nearer. I spent a day dallying with the trout instead, and proceeded on my interminable horseback trip.

I made it a point to look up your one-time townsman, Charlie Dyson, Mr. Dyson, who was recently married, has acquired a very comfortable home, and his work and careful management have made him independent. He still carries on his work as a blacksmith, however, and has more than he can do. Charlie is a steady and competent blacksmith, and retiring from the active work of life. "But," he says, "a man must keep putting away his gold for the rainy day, maybe." Charlie's idea of "putting away" fits my conception of down-right hard work to a nicety.

You have perhaps been informed of the serious accident which recently happened to Mrs. Berry, relict of the late Wm. Berry, a former Chathamite. Mrs. Berry, at the ranch of her son-in-law, Mr. Harry Jenkins, on the Kootenai River, was feeding a young colt, when the animal lunged forward. Mrs. Berry's arm was broken at the elbow joint, by being bent backward against a post near which the unfortunate lady was standing. She is, I am pleased to state, doing as well as could be expected, though it is probable that the elbow will always be stiff.

Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins were in the east at the time; but Doctor Jenkins was upon his place, next below on the river, and Miss Jenkins and Mrs. Berry's elder daughter, Mrs. James Beaumont, proved very capable and efficient nurses.

Crops of all kinds are in good fix here at present, and there is every prospect of a heavy yield for the new farmers. Brome grass does exceedingly well here, which is a blessing under the new restricted conditions in which the ranchers are placed. As I write, two samples of it stand in a corner near me. Some of it is quite over six feet high. Experiment here has proven it expedient to sow timothy with the brome grass, the main benefit claimed for this mixture being the increased gratifying results during the first two years.

It is so long since I've written you, and there is so much unsaid, so much to say, I scarcely know what to do about it all. Under these circumstances the best thing to do is to quit.

AT CANADA'S FINE CAPITAL

J. W. Young has Met With Many
Interesting Incidents.

An old Maple City Military man and a
Young Baptist Preacher Chat of
This Fair City.

Rushing into Ottawa on an evening train gives one very little idea of the marvelous natural beauties of the capital of the Dominion. The C. P. R. enters from Carleton Place, through the Ottawa valley, which is low lying, and the passenger has but little chance to see anything of the city or the river, beyond a glimpse of the latter at Britannia, one of the many summer resorts where the residents of this beautiful city enjoy themselves. I confess that I was disappointed when I first saw Ottawa, but I haven't been long in changing—notwithstanding it is said first impressions are the best.

This is the first large city I have visited of which I have desired to become a resident. Ottawa is simply grand in scenery and picturesque in situation. But more of this later.

After deciding on a western vacation trip, the first thing that I thought of was a ticket. Knowing that the C. P. R. was the line of railway that had first crossed the virgin prairie of the Canadian West Country, and being also aware that W. H. Harper was the city passenger agent of the C. P. R., I at once consulted him and found that I had done just right. When you travel west, east, north or south, consult ex-Ald. Harper. He has been a railroad man his entire life and knows all about railroads—and a few other things. His advice is invaluable.

The time-table was another problem that confronted me. When I first secured a record of the time that trains go on the C. P. R. I thought of those who had tried to square the circle and would have given up in despair had not a bright thought struck me, and I sought the aid of Mr. Harper's assistants in his office. Under their guidance the meaning of the figures and names were unveiled and became something more than mere digits and words. Thus it was brought about that the time-table was understood.

Notwithstanding it was Friday this trip west was begun. Being an unlucky day it rained. It was also the last of August, and I plus 11 made 13. How horridly suggestive of impending trouble were all these evil omens. The time-table was understood.

At Woodstock the Baptist minister at Galt took a seat next by. He is a young man and proved good company. Unfortunately he didn't tell me his name. However, he knew many Chatham people, including Judge Houston. This minister was a college mate of the Rev. Thomas Cornish, now of Pontiac, and as a student was stationed at Dresden 16 months. He preached in Rev. J. J. Ross' pulpit three years ago while the latter was away on his holidays and while in the Maple City was the guest of Hugh McDonald, Raleigh street. He pointed out the house near which was dilapidated by a hurricane. That is, the house was. The building the track, while we were passing, is an awful wreck. The structure is of brick; yet the roof had been torn off by the force of the tempest, and the four walls remain standing, to show what the wind can do. At Toronto, Chas. Hackney, a former Chathamite, met me, and I spent a very pleasant night at his home.

Saturday morning at 9.15, the services of the C. P. R. railway were again sought, Ottawa being being objective point. Unfortunately, I found no congenial passengers on the train, but the country was new and interesting. The news butcher took a money

interest in me and tried to sell his whole stock in trade. It recalled to my mind that I ever travelled alone. I was somewhat of a little had then and I had just 50 cents pocket money. The news and edible vendor had some mince which he wanted me to buy, just because I was going so far from home, and I believe I would have plunged with all my pile had this money not been packed carefully away in the bottom of my grip by relative who knew my failing.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Our City Council Transacts Business in the day Time.

A New Flg. for the Civic Building—
Other Doings at the Aldermanic Board.

The City Council held a special meeting yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock. There were present: Mayor Sulman and Aldermen Cowan, McCoo, Mounter, Madsen, Edmondson and Fleming.

A petition was received from a number of ratepayers to have part of Park street widened.—Referred to the Clerk.

A communication was received from Mr. Maude, Secretary to the Governor-General, informing the aldermen that the Duke and Duchess of York would not be able to visit Chatham.

Another item read from Lewis & Richards, solicitors for Atch. Park and others, re the William street sewer.—Referred to Board of Works.

A communication from P. B. Fetterly re dog tax was referred to Finance.

Another from E. W. Watson was also referred to Finance.

Ald. McCoo asked if the plan of the King street pavement at the corner of William street was a permanent job.

He was informed that it is not. Ald. McCoo complained out because of some local contractors that jobs that should be let for contract are done by the City Board of Works.

Ald. Marshall said that there was only one case, that of the Collegiate Institute sewer. The work is being done by the Board of Works and charged to the Collegiate Institute Board.

Mayor Sulman notified the Council that the reason that the city flag was not put out on the day of the death of the late Empress was because the flag was not in a condition to be put up, being entirely torn to pieces. He had ordered a new flag, which arrived yesterday. It is now flying at half mast on Tecumseh Park.

The Mayor called the attention to the bad condition of Tecumseh Park. Paper scattered all over the Park, the benches are broken, and the fountain needs repairing.

The matter was attended to by the committee.

Cowan—Edmondson, that Mr. Watson be allowed to trim trees under the supervision of the Chief of Police.—Carried.

Marshall—Mounter, that the Board of Works be empowered to purchase 200 feet of rubber hose to be used in flushing sewers.—Carried.

Cowan—Edmondson, that the Mayor attend the meeting of Mayors in Toronto, which will be held to discuss municipal matters.
