French Chamber of Deputies Cal's Upon French Government to Stop it.

Paris, Dec. 12. — In the Chamber of Deputies yesterday M. Marie Edouard Valliant, Socialist, one of the Deputies for the Department of the Seine, moved a resolution calling upon the Government to prohibit the manufacture and sale of all alcoholic liquors product "dangerous" by the Academy and sale of all alcoholic liquors pro-nounced "dangerous" by the Academy of Medicine. The resolution was aim-ed at absinthe, the consumption of which has nearly doubled in France since 1894, and now stands at 10,000,000 litres annually. M.
