THE GAYNOR-GREENE CASE.

Judge Caron, of Quebec, has decided that the two millionaire absconders from the United States, Messrs. Gaymor and Greene, over whom officers of the law in Montreal and Quebec had such a sensational tussle a few weeks ago, are entitled to their freedom, comments the Toronto News.

These two men are charged with conspiracy to defraud, and have with them a large amount of ill-gotten money. They were arrested in Quebec, kidnaped and brought to Montreal by detectives acting under a warrant issued by a Montreal judge, and finally returned to custody in Quebec, to stand their trial. At the time the government at Washington protested against what were characterized as improper efforts to secure the freedom of the two criminals fairs. contrary to the provisions of the extradition treaty. Now Judge Caron has liberated the prisoners because of what are claimed to be imperfections in the warrant for arrest, and limitations in the treaty.

Yet these two men are guilty, for they admitted guilt by fleeing from justice in their own country. The struggle between the legal talent in Quebec and Montreal for possession of the prisoners at least suggests that they were willing to pay well for securing liberty with money which was not honestly come by. The government at Washington has protested against what was a most unusual and irregular proceeding at the time of their arrest even if it was within the letter of the law.

The extradition treaty was framed to cover just such cases as this one undoubtedly is. If Judge Caron's judgment is right, then the law is wrong and inadequate. These two criminals should be returned to the United States to answer this criminal charge against them. Canada doesn't want criminals from that country, even if they do disgorge their ill-gotten millions with a lavish hand.
