There was no intention on the part of anyone to misrepresent this part of the performance. It was just one of those cases where at the last moment things went wrong, and it was found impossible to get the war films to work.

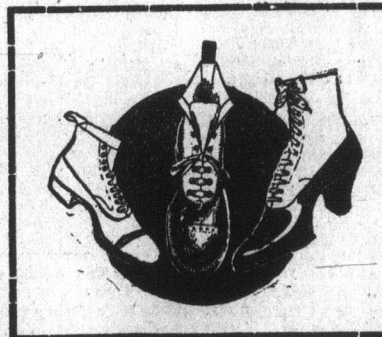
### ANDERSON - CURTIS
