A STRONG GOVERNMENT.

The speech from the Throne, given at the opening of the Legislature yesterday, and published in full in The Planet, contains a very lengthy program of important issues, which will occupy the attention of the House during the present session. If the full program is carried out, and Mr. Whitney and his colleagues continue along the fines already mapped out, Ontario's destinies will be perfectly safe in the hands of this intelligent and progressive Govern-

This promises to be a busy session and there is no doubt that the action on the various matters proposed to be dealt with, will be fruitful of much useful legislation. Among the most important of these are the educational reforms. These will be dealt with along lines very much similar to those which have been previously mentioned in this journal, and which have been received with such hearty approbation all over the

Among other things which will come before the gentlemen composing the Legislative Assembly will be the Amendment to the Liquor Act, Colonization work, The Amendment to the Mining Laws, The Amendment to the County Councils Act, The Railway Act Revision, The Revision of the Street and Electric Railway Act, Railway Taxation, and the many other measures mentioned in the address will all come in for their fair share of attention.

Much has been looked for from Premier Whitney, but the list of reforms contemplated is far in excess of the expectations of the most sanguine. The prevailing feeling seems to be that Mr. Whitney has started out on a strong constructive policy. He has conceived a practical insight into the pressing needs of the country and will give force and vigor to the business of the Province in its various phases.

We shall have a thoroughly business session, giving us an installment of the reforms for which the people have so long looked in vain.

THE SPREADING OF DISEASE.

A few days ago a case was brought to light by the press, of infection through paper money. A person handling money bills was infected with a very serious optic disease and doctors without difficulty traced the origination of it to paper money.

It is surprising that such a thing could be made public without attracting more than ordinary attention from medical men and deep thinking people, yet the object lesson of this case seems to have passed unnoticed by the majority of newspaper readers and doctors.

Authorities have said that a coinage is much less liable to spread is the case the withdrawal of the latter should at least receive the consideration of the Governments of Canada and the United States. This is conceded to be a matter which cannot be dealt with in a day and there may be many difficulties which would confront those who would undertake its advancement.

There is, however, another great influence in the spreading of disease which can readily be rectified, and which should receive prompt at tention. Books are taken away from Free Lending Libraries and returned without any guarantee that the borrower is not living in a diswould it not be wise to pass a bylaw compelling borrowers to sign declaration to the contrary and making it a punishable offense to re turn a book from a disease infected house without declaring the same to the Library officials?

It would certainly minimise the danger of disease being unconscious ly spread by these worthy and useful institutions, and in the cause of humanity anything that can be done to fight disease should be done at once and done willingly.

It is much easier to profit by the mistakes of others than by our own. All the great work in the world is simply doing the best that is in us.

sort of a place is it? I like it fine.

sort of a place is it? I like it fine, It is a splendid little city, about 12,000 population, wide awake and up to date. When I tell you that it has to date. When I tell you that it has more than 15 miles of excellently paved streets you will know that this is a fact. It is a fine business town. It is situated in the centre of the fat Ontarian peninsula between the lakes, the garden of Can-ada, where everything from tobacco and grapes to wheat, corn, barley and beans, is grown. Four railroads, an electric line and steamers on the Thames river and great lakes furnish abundant transportation facili-

"How about the weather? What sort of a winter have we had at Chatham? Well, there is the biggest surprise of all. I had heard so much about Our Lady of the Snows that I really expected some cold weather. But we haven't had any. I used to boast a good bit of our Italian skies and Florida zephyrs here in Pocatello, but I must admit that for mildness this winter at Chatham beats everything I have seen before. The river, a sluggish stream, has never been frozen over.
