## Evil Effects of Smoking.

Tobacco is manufactured from the dried leaves of an American plant, now grown in many parts of the world. It contains a powerful poison called nicotine, which is very harmful to the body in many ways. Nicotine, when pure, is a colorless oil, and one-tenth of it will poison a dog. There is sufficient of this poison (if taken in one dose), in one ordinary cigar, or in one-eighth of an ounce of mild tobacco, or in six cigarettes, to poison two men. When tobacco is smoked, the poison gets into the system, usually producing faintness, nausea, giddiness, loss of power over the muscles and limbs, cold perspiration, and vomiting often accompanied with purging, together with a sinking feeling at the heart. The system may in time get used to the poison, but the ill-effects remain. It is recognized by all who go in for any special athletic effort, and smoking is forbidden to those who are training for swimming, rowing, football, running, jumping, etc.—Everybody's Monthly.
