## UNNECESSARY EXPENDITURE.

The attention of our citizens should be directed to the condition into which we are drifting and to the ultimate result, if the present course of financing and management of the town is continued. It was the object of the present council when elected to appropriate \$10,000 and keep within that amount, so far the appropriation had been made but it cannot be said that the departments have kept within their allotments and the expenditure is still being maintained and fostered by the present council. Not being content with having a jail at the county seat it is the feeling of a few that we should have another one here, so a new lot of land has been purchased costing in the neighborhood of three hundred dollars, this being done without an appropriation from the council, which is illegal and on which the citizens have had no opportunity of declaring whether they were favorable or not, as this was not at all considered when the present council was elected to power. It is thought by some of the council to begin work on the new jail this coming winter as fall is about past and it started will be done so at the most unfavorable time of the year, to say nothing of other considerations in the matter. A building such as proposed will cost nothing less than \$2,000 including the land, one favorable comment however, might be said in its favor if built of concrete blocks, that it would give employment to a few, thus benefiting the whole community to accomplish this end.

It would have been far better if the present council had taken the present property and utilized it for the above purposes by putting a basement under the present Town Hall, thus keeping down unnecessary expenditure, in the second place it is not economically sound. We must consider that we only have a population of 1,000 people who are being taxed \$12,000 for school purposes, \$10,000 for Town purposes and in the line of Churches we are giving at least \$10,000 annually, to say nothing of the calls which come to us from all quarters. We must call a halt both in our private and public expenditure. There is no reason whatever that the Town council could not affect reductions in expenditure in several other ways, attention to which will be drawn in other articles which will appear in due course. In closing this article on the question of a Town jail, it is the opinion of the writer that the Town of Hartland needs one about as much as a cat needs two tails.

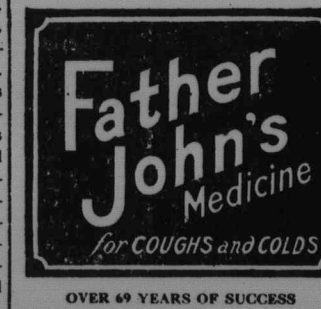

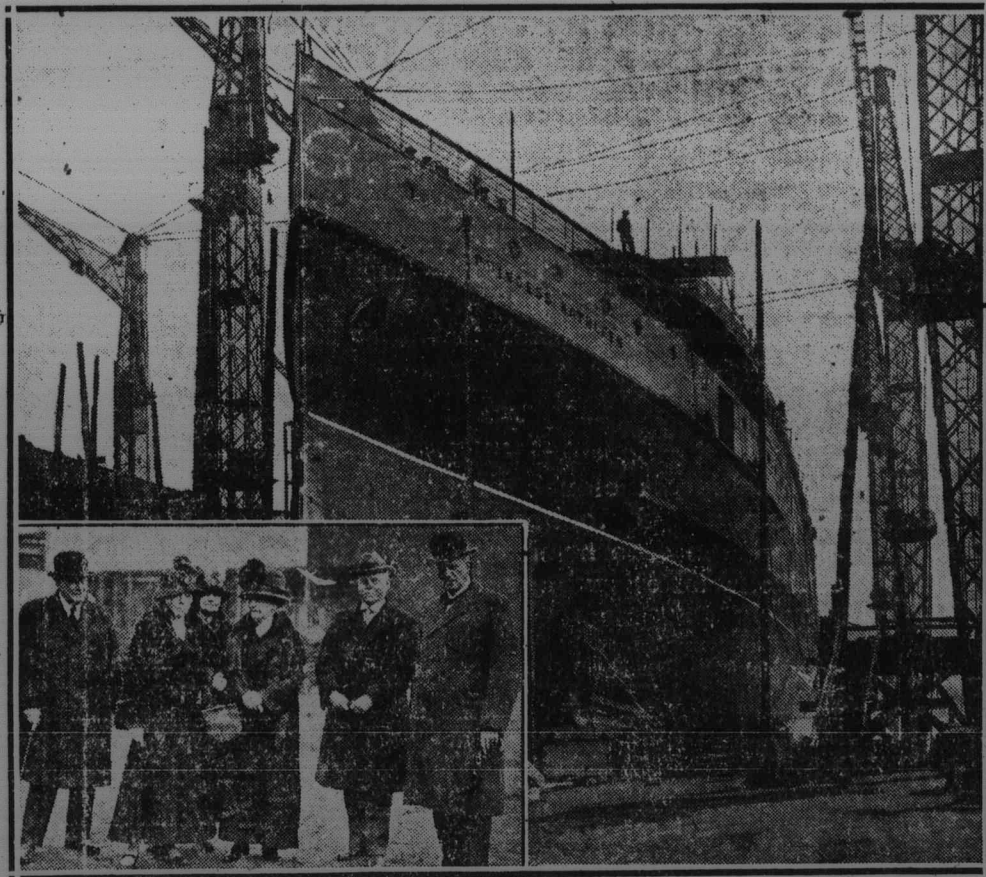

## New Oil Burners For Pacific Coast.

It is a long way from Alaska to the Clyde, but the recent launching of the Canadian Pacific Coastal S.S. "Princess Kathleen" from the Clydebank yards of John Brown and Company illustrates how the increasing business, traffic and industry of the one has affected the industry of the other. The launching of another vessel, the Princess Marguerite, will further illustrate this, shortly. During the past few years the thousand mile trip to the "land of the Midnight Sun" and return to Vancouver has attracted thousands of tourists from all parts of the world. Many of these, appreciating the industrial and commercial possibilities of this country of vast natural resources, as much as the scenic splendours, have established themselves there and have drawn others round them, each of whom plays a part in the further development of the land. The same thing applies to the Yukon, so that, especially in the Summer, and in the Fall when the big game and fish are fair sport, there is a constant coming and going on the Princess steamers that ply the "Inland Passage."

Next Year there will, it is expected, be a demand for a still more frequent service. In response the Canadian Pacific will recruit from its "Triangular" service, and the new steamers will take up the service thus relieved between Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle. This route is also becoming increasingly popular, the present call being for vessels which are able to transport the automobiles of those hundreds of tourists who are finding the glories of Vancouver Island well worth while.

The new vessels, twin screw and oil-burning, will be, when completed, the largest and fastest ships operating between the three ports, being capable of sustaining a speed of 22 1/2 knots. Altogether there are five decks, four of which are given over to the use of the passengers, while a large space on the main deck has been provided for the transport of motor cars and other freight. Accommodation is arranged for 325 first-class night passengers in two and three berth cabins, and for over one thousand day passengers. A special feature of the accommodation is the provision of 17 large rooms on the promenade and upper decks, having private bathrooms attached and 22 two-berth cabins, on the boat deck, having private shower baths. The accommodation throughout has been arranged with the greatest care for the safety and comfort of the passengers and is of a uniform standard throughout, while the accommodation for the officers and crew is substantially better than is required by regulations.

Both vessels will be placed in service early in 1925.
