### McGraw Wins Fight

OVER RUBE BENTON.  
New York, Aug. 26—The board of directors of the National League announced today that Rube Benton, formerly of the Cincinnati Club, was legally the property of the New York National League club.

John McGraw, hearing that Cincinnati wished to sell Benton, secured a verbal, twenty-day option on the services of the Red player. Two days before the option was up, and while Benton was still playing for Cincinnati, Fred Clarke made the owners of the Reds a better offer for Benton and the player was turned over to the Pirates. McGraw heard of Benton's sale, and protested to the president of the Reds, from whom he had secured his option. Clark refused to part with Benton on the grounds that he had paid for him without any knowledge of option held by the Giants. This brought the matter to the attention of the league heads with the above decision.

New York, Aug. 26—Richard "Rube" Marquard, left-handed pitcher, was sold today by the New York Nationals to the Toronto Club of the International League. Under the terms of the transaction the Giants are to get pitcher Herbert from the Canadian team. Marquard declared his unwillingness to join the Toronto club and wants his unconditional release.

The Red Cross trap shoot at Vancouver on Wednesday was won by James McIntyre with a score of 49 out of 50.

## MRS NELLIE M'CLUNG WILL SPEAK TONIGHT

Mrs. Nellie McClung, the noted Canadian authoress, will address a public meeting in the Presbyterian church at 8 o'clock tonight. Her work as an authoress has won for her high esteem among the reading public. Her first book, "Sowing Seeds in Danny" began as a short story and ended as a little book, so full of humor and originality that it has become very popular. Her next book "The Second Chance" followed quickly, which is a typical story of the west. She has also written other stories which are full of optimism, common sense, kindness and humor.

As a speaker she has the power of blending humor and pathos so as to reach the hearts of her hearers. She is a strong temperance advocate and took a leading part in the Manitoba and Alberta campaigns. She was born in Ontario but has spent most of her life on the prairies where she received her education. Since coming to British Columbia she has received an enthusiastic welcome. Her first meeting was held in the Orpheum theatre Vancouver, when fully 5000 people clamored for admission, and the police had to be called to clear away the overflow.

All the temperance organizations of Nanaimo will be represented at tonight's meeting and the public has this rare opportunity of hearing so distinguished a speaker.

Mrs. Graydon and Mr. Evan Jones, two of Nanaimo's popular soloists will assist on the program, while Mr. A. Dunsmore will act as accompanist. The meeting is free to all but an offering will be taken up. During her stay in Nanaimo Mrs. McClung will be the guest of Ald. C. Brown.

## SERGT. A. H. HOBBS WRITES TO FRIEND

A letter has been received in the city from Sergt. A. H. Hobbs, formerly of Nanaimo, a British army reservist who left here during the early stages of the war to serve with the Fourth Middlesex regiment. Mr. Hobbs has two brothers at present in the army, Arthur, with the nineteenth battalion and Sydney with the home service in Montreal.

Mr. Hobbs wrote as follows: "I am glad to say we are at last at rest once more after 23 days in the trenches. We came down here on Saturday night or early Sunday morning, the 20th, and it felt pretty good to get our boots and putties off and lie down and have a night's sleep, although it was on the ground with boots for a pillow and overcoat for covering. But that sleep was sweet, for there was nothing to disturb me. We have been in a warm corner on the Menin road near Hooge and had to come through Ypres. What a mess they have made of that city! It must be a place as big as Hamilton and not a house left standing, and the beautiful cathedral knocked to pieces. About two miles from our trenches and on our left was Langemark, where so many of the Canadian boys laid down their lives for the empire on April 26. We were at Hill 60 for two weeks during May and we were so close where I was that they threw bricks from their trenches which our lads at once returned, together with a few hand grenades. One night when things were quiet we heard a gramophone going in their lines, and some times they shouted insulting remarks at us. I was glad to get away from there, but we only got half a mile from the trench when a couple of stray bullets hit two of our fellows one in the back and the other in the knee. I am enclosing letter from the fellow who got hit in the knee. I stayed with them until the stretcher bearers came up and took them away. After that I lost my way and walked all night, finally finding the camp at 4 a.m.

"We had three days' rest and then came up to Ypres on May 24. Our sergeant-major was hit on the night of the 11th. A stray bullet hit him in the foot and the captain told me to be acting sergeant-major, which I am still doing, but I expect one of the senior sergeants will be promoted as I am still a junior sergeant. I had a letter from the sergeant today. He is now in the hospital at Whitechurch, near Cardiff and this is what he says: 'This place was a lunatic asylum, but they turned them all out to make room for us, so hurry and come here. At present there are 150 wounded soldiers and the staff is made up of about 50 nurses and 50 other hands, and 20 in the laundry, so it works out nearly one of the staff to each of the patients.'

"We are all wondering when Kitchen's army is coming out, so that some of us can get to England for a few days. I think I shall be able to get away next March if God is good enough to spare me till then. My time was up last March, but they can keep me another year if they wish, so unless another order on the subject comes up in the meantime I have still nine months to serve; but I hope I don't have to do another winter out here, although I see by the papers that they are getting ready for it."

REVOLUTION IS CRUSHED.  
Willemstad, Curacao, Aug. 26—Advices reaching this point from Venezuela state that the revolution begun last September has been crushed by government forces and its leader Horatio DoCharne, killed. At the outset of the revolt DoCharne won a measure of success and was reported to be well supported in the region in which the movement was inaugurated.

The Canadian Red Cross headquarters, Toronto, has shipped nearly 16,000 cases of supplies for use in the hospitals and convalescent homes and other Red Cross stations in Europe. Of this number over 2,600 were sent during the past month.

### ITALY'S ROYAL NURSES

#### DO MUCH FOR COUNTRY.

Like Queen Amelia of Portugal, the Queen of Italy is a properly qualified nurse, and has done much of late years to perfect the hospitals of Rome. Among Her Majesty's treasured possessions is the decoration of the Royal Red Cross presented to her by King Edward in recognition of her noble efforts after the disaster at Messina. Queen Elena, who will stay at Florence to be near the armies while her husband is at the front, has established hospitals in all the Royal palaces, including the Quirinal. She is fully in sympathy with the action of her adopted country in this war, as Austria is also an enemy of her native Montenegro. Her sister, Princess Xenia, is undergoing training in a hospital at Naples.

The Duchess of Acosta, Queen Amelia's sister, has also made herself an efficient nurse and also gained experience at Messina and elsewhere when earthquakes devastated parts of Italy. While her husband commands one of the five Italian field armies, the Duchess has placed their palace at Turin at the disposal of the Red Cross authorities. She goes about her nursing work in ordinary nurse's uniform as Sister Helene. She is a splendidly resourceful woman and an all-round sportswoman as her travels in the wilds of Africa have testified.

### BRITISH AVIATOR KILLED

London, Aug. 26—Sub-Lieut. John McLarty of the Royal Naval Flying Corps was killed while flying a seaplane over Southampton water on the English coast. The machine met with a mishap and McLarty fell out dropping 2,000 feet.
