Mr. Hobbs has two brothers at present in the army, Arthur, with the nineteenth battalion and Sydney with the home service in Montreal. Mr. Hobbs wrote as follows:

We came down here on Saturday night or early Sunday morning, the 20th, and it felt pretty good to get our boots and putties off and lie down and have a night's sleep, although it was on the ground with boots for a pillow and overcoat for covering.
