**HONORS FOR DEWEY.**

**WASHINGTON, May 10.**—Both branches of Congress on Monday passed a bill increasing the number of rear admirals from six to seven, in order that the President might nominate Commodore Dewey to the highest position in the navy within his gift.

**AID FOR THE INSURGENTS.**  
**TAMPA, Fla., May 10.**—The Mallory line steamer *Gustie* has sailed for Cuba with a cargo of between six and seven thousand Springfield rifles, about 200,000 rounds of ammunition and several hundred boxes of provisions, all intended for the insurgents. A company of one hundred United States troops accompanied the expedition. The steamer *Whitney* will also leave with arms, ammunition and provisions as soon as they can be loaded.

**NEW YORK, May 10.**—A Key West special to the World says: The torpedo boat *Winnow* engaged the Spanish gunboats off Cardenas Bay on Monday afternoon. She disabled one and caused one unscathed. The shooting was brisk on both sides, but no fatalities ensued. After the Spanish boat *Pizon* was disabled, the *Winnow* withdrew from the scene of the torpedo boat, taking refuge in Cardenas Bay.

**WASHINGTON, May 10.**—Assistant Secretary Melkijohn to-day chartered about thirty ships with capacity of 55,000 men. They are to be used to convey troops to Cuba and the Philippines. General Miles and his entire staff will leave Washington to-night for Tampa, Fla., to accompany the first military expedition to Cuba unless present plans are changed.

**PORTO RICO RECEIVES SUPPLIES.**  
**MADRID, May 10, 11.30 p. m.**—An official dispatch from Porto Rico says the *Bilbao* has arrived there, protected by Spanish warships. She was chased by an American warship. The dispatch also says that provision ships have arrived assisting Porto Rico's supply for several months.

**BOARDED BY SPANIARDS.**  
**CHATHAM, May 10.**—The British steamer *Narra*, from Bari on April 25 for London, has arrived here and reports having been boarded at one o'clock this morning, 18 miles east of Europa Point, by an armed party from a Spanish cruiser, which fired across the steamer's bow. The officer in command of the boarding party examined the papers of the *Narra* and then allowed her to proceed.
