BOYS' SCRAP FATAL. FOREIGNERS IDLE BUT NOT SUFFERING

(Continued from page 1.)

had been throwing the scrap at the dead boy all morning, and that the deceased had blamed him for doing it, and warned him to stop. Some more leather went over his head, and the first thing he knew he was hit in the side. He turned around and got a blow in the face, and throwing up his hands to stop the blows, the dead boy ran on the knife and laid his face open with it. At the time this story was told Kirkpatrick did not know he had caused death, and it is doubtful if he knew that there was such a wound. The father and Mr. Thomson did not know this, either, till they were spoken to about it shortly before noon to-day, and both were greatly surprised.

At the Police Court this morning the young lad, hardly more than a boy, sat in the end of the dock, with Constable Duncan to guard him. When Mr. Thomson came in he immediately went over to the boy and talked with him about the boy and the matter, the boy telling the above story. "Did you know that the boy was dead?" "Died through the night," asked his counsel.

"Dear! Dear! That's too bad," said Kirkpatrick.

He did not seem to realize what he had to face, and seemed to think that the story he told was the right one.

The dead boy's father is a moulder, and the family have been in this city for years. They never showed any signs of grief, and the parents are heart-broken over the affair.

The prisoner's father sold his farm four years ago, and moved to this city. The boy wanted to learn a trade, and was put to work in the steam factory two years ago. The prisoner was addicted to bad habits, and has received a good training and education. His mother is dead, but his father has married since, and the stepmother was completely broken up over the arrest of the boy, and had always been a good boy to his parents. He is the only son. The prisoner's father seemed to be the catastrophe this morning, and had little to say.

It was some time after the tragedy that the police heard that such a thing had happened, and they first learned through the newspapers, representatives of which called them up several times about the case. Later on Constable May, who was at the police station, was sent to the scene to arrest whoever had done the stabbing, which was thought to be of a trifling nature. He arrested Kirkpatrick and took him to the cells at No. 3 Police Station, where the charge of cutting and wounding was registered against him. He seemed to feel his position very keenly then. This morning he hardly seemed to realize his position, and looked around in a wondering way at the people, and answered quietly, without any signs of nervousness, when spoken to by his lawyer, "Sergeant Knox called me twice before he stood up, and then Crown Attorney Washington asked for a remand for a week, which was granted. He was removed to the cells without anything more being said about the case. He brightened up and smiled when his father spoke to him."

When Crown Attorney Washington first heard of the case this morning, he put Coroner McNicol to work on it, and Constable May was charged with the summoning of a jury, which met at noon at the house of the deceased, where his body is now lying for years it has been the practice to "initiate" newcomers at the shoe factory by hazing them, and making them the victims of all kinds of jokes. On several occasions, they say, they have been called to the alley in the rear because of trouble that had been started in this way. The same practice, they say, prevails in many factories.

The knife with which the cutting was committed is of steel, and is five or six inches long. It is sharpened to a razor edge, so that it is strong material, that will cut hard leather almost half an inch thick, so that it would not take much of a job to make it penetrate the human skin.

A theory has been advanced by some who have heard both the stories is that after going back to his own bench the dead youth picked up his knife and went to work. Kirkpatrick went over and the trouble followed, and Cummings fell. The theory is that he fell on his own knife.

JUDGE APPROVES Of the Petit Jurors' Petition for More Pay.

The Assize Court concluded its labors this morning, and Justice Teetzel laid the rest of the non-jury cases over until the next sitting. Mrs. Carrie Dewey was awarded \$875 by the jury in the Dewey vs. Hamilton & Dundas Railway case yesterday afternoon, for the death of her father, T. B. Fairchild. One last time the case was tried the jury awarded her \$2,000, but Justice Hiddell, who was presiding at the time, allowed a non-jury trial. The Divisional Court, however, ordered a new trial. Mr. A. M. Lewis appeared for the plaintiff, and J. W. Nesbitt represented the company.

INJUNCTION GRANTED.

Judge Snider gave judgment this morning in the action of Harper vs. Brown for \$75 damages, and dismissed the counter claim of the stabling, which was thought to be of a trifling nature. He granted the plaintiffs an injunction against the defendants from further encroaching on the property of the plaintiffs. The action arose over Brown building a portion of a shed on the property of Harper. Mr. John G. Farmer for the plaintiff, and W. M. McClelland for the defendant.
