A NEW ARRANGEMENT. Involving the Retirement of Queen's

Printer Fenety. At the meeting of the local government held last week, arrangements were made with Queen's printer Fenety, under legislation passed in 1891, whereby that official retires, and the new law comes in force.

The change is thus explained by Hon. Mr. Blair in an interview published in the Tellieutenancy in the Brighton engineers, Car-Reporter-I observe, Mr. Attorney General, that some action has been taken in respect to the office of queen's printer.

Mr. Blair-Yes, we have been able to make satisfactory arrangements whereby the act, passed by the legislature in 1891, to extinguish the office of queen's printer as it has hitherto existed, may be brought into operation by proclamation of the lieut,

Reporter-May I be permitted to ask, how soon will this take place? Mr. Blair-Quite probably inside of a

Reporter -Will there be Mr. Blair-Oh, yes, there will still be ueen's printer, but under very different onditions. The act we had passed in 1891, provides that there shall be a practical printer appointed to look after the publication of the Royal Gazette, seeing to official advertisements, and such private advertising as usually finds its place in the Gazette, collect advertising charges, and to exercise a general supervison over the publicaton. The plan we have adopted is to make a contract for the printing of the Gazette, and we think we can effect considerable saving in the office. The Royal Gazette office, now, outside of its receipts for private advertising, which would probably amount to, on an average, \$1,500 a year, receives from the province for the Gazette itself and government advertising, about \$2,200 to \$2,500 a year. The two amount in the neighborhood of \$4,000, and we think we can save about \$2,000 to the exchequer of the province by adopting the present scheme.

The Bridge Investigation (Toronto Globe.)

Mr. VanWart, who was questioned by Sir Richard Cartwright, said that the capital stock amounted to \$200,000, divided into 2,000 shares of \$100 each; that Thomas Temple M. P., held 985 shares, Alex. Gibson 985, Mr. Gibson, jun., Mr. Rowley and F. S. Martha M. Scott, both of Canterbury Hilyard, ten shares each. No stock or transfer books were kept and the shares emained as they had been originally apportioned. No calls had been made on the tock, though \$90,000 had been paid by the shareholders in cash. A contract was enered into by the bridge company for the onstruction of the foundation piers and steel superstructure for \$350,000, of which amount the company received \$287,000 by way of a loan from the government. Besides the loan, there was an issue of \$50,000 in bonds, payable in six years, with interest at 6 per cent., bearing the personal guarantee of Alexander Gibson and Thomas Temple. These bonds were paid in August, 1893, and cancelled. In addition to the amount mentioned, \$119,000 had been paid for tracks at each end of the bridge, land damages, and rip rapping of cribs. Of this amount the company got \$15,000 from the government by way of subsidy. The total ubsidy was \$30,000, but \$15,000 was retained by the government for arrears of interest on the loan of \$300,000. The bridge had cost altogether about \$419,000. The

present liability of the company consisted of the government loan of \$300,000, a floating debt of \$19,000, and the upaid interest of \$72,000. 


