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A ROYAL IRISH WELCOME.

The Rev. Father Quinlan, representing the Archbishop, paid a graceful tribute to Lady Aberdeen, and so did Dr. Hingston. Mayor Desjarlais made a happy speech and was followed by Canon Henderson.

Lady Aberdeen again addressed the meeting and proposed a vote of thanks, which was passed. He promised that there would be a book night on account of the slogan at reference to the triple alliance of loyalty and community that existed in this great Dominion.

Lady Aberdeen authorized him to say that they would have an Irish play on the 18th of November, when the rest of the Irish Collections will arrive in this city.

Miss Sullivan played "The Irish Girl" on the harp, and she was recalled, the double quartette then sang another song, "God Save the Queen" and "Auld Lang Syne" brought the meeting to an end.

The following is the address delivered by Her Excellency which was enthusiastically received:

LADY ABERDEEN'S REPLY.

Her Excellency, upon rising to reply, received an ovation. After the applause had subsided, she returned thanks to all those who had given this splendid demonstration of sympathy and welcome to those whom she had come to look upon as her children.

The Irish play had been a success from every point of view, and this was largely due to the secretary, Mr. Peter White, who organized it and to his brave little widow, who continued the work after his death.

During the six months that the work was in progress, it had over half a million visitors, and some forty or fifty thousand dollars worth of Irish goods were sold; they had opened up a permanent market for Irish goods in the United States; that had, at least, 26 awards and 10 medals, and the experts in lace and embroidery and other products were unanimous in their opinion that there was nothing in that direction in the exhibition that could beat what was shown there.

"And," she continued, "it has shown to the world the Irishman and Irishwoman of all classes, all creeds, and all sections in politics, can work together heartily and harmoniously.
