It is ungentlemanly not to say disorderly, to utter any sound or make any observation on what a speaker is saying. The speaker must be in the strictest order, so long as he keeps to order; and if not in order, it is the chairman's duty to check him. It is likewise disorderly to speak more than once, except in replying before the vote is put, or except in the case of the assembly to permit it.

NEWS OF THE WEEK.

At Pittston, Pa., on the 14th, Henry Martin, aged 17, shot and killed his mother, who interfered in a quarrel between him and his brother-in-law.

A Vienna despatch from St. Petersburg, Nov. 17, says serious disturbances occurred among students there, growing out of the arrest of several students who refused to take the oath of allegiance to the Czar.

A special despatch from La Paz, Bolivia, to New York, of a recent date, says: There has been a violent shock of earthquake along the northern coast of Chile and in this country. One hundred people have been killed by seismic disturbances within a radius of 40 miles from this city. The Cathedral here has been rendered unsafe.

In a terrible storm on the 15th, the schooner Antelope, of Chicago, capsized near the mouth of Grand Haven Harbor, Michigan. The three men who were on board were killed. The schooner Antelope failed to make the harbor and safety on the beach. So quickly did the Antelope disappear it was impossible for the life saving station to render her crew any assistance.

A ten-year-old boy named Willie Roberts was killed while playing with some boys on the railway tracks at the foot of Brook Street, Toronto, on Saturday afternoon. The boy was standing on the end of a car that was being uncoupled, when some other cars were shunted into it. The boy was knocked off, and falling on to the track the car passed over his neck, killing him instantly. His father who comes in a similar manner at the same place a few years ago.

Fourteen cases of smallpox were discovered by the health authorities in New York City on Monday last week, and two cases of the same disease have been unearthed at Milwaukee. There are no less than one hundred and twenty-five cases of this disease in the city of London, and on Tuesday last week a man named Watson buried himself in a grave, and his wife, all of whom were in good health one month ago.

The steamer Barbara Boscovitch from the north to Vancouver B. C., on the 14th inst., was wrecked on the shore of the death of the five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Williscroft, Skena river. The party were at Fort Simpson waiting for the steamer and the girl and her brother were playing in a room when a loaded cart from the wall and exploded, the charge blowing off the top of the girl's head. Mr. and Mrs. Williscroft were en route to the city to spend the winter with relatives.

London advices of the 15th says: The British ship Calmair, last reported at Hamburg October 1, from Louisaque, foundered in the North Sea, fifty miles off Spurn Head, Yorkshire. Twenty-two persons were drowned including the captain and his wife. Eight of the bodies were washed ashore at Worthing this morning. It is believed the British steamer Calmair was wrecked at Hamburg November 1, from Staff was also lost yesterday. Heavy fogs are reported on the island of Cyprus. A despatch from Timaua says 21 persons have been drowned and the number of domestic animals destroyed is far into the thousands.

A London despatch of the 16th says: A meeting of the British commission merchants, who import Canadian cheese, has been called for an early date to discuss the alleged frauds said to be perpetrated on the trade by some of the largest Canadian shippers. These people, it is said, are sending out summer made cheese labeled as "September" make, and thereby securing much higher prices for a much inferior article. Such action on the part of Canadian shippers is it is represented, sure to imperil Canada's cheese trade with the British Islands, as well as other European countries. A deputation is to wait on Sir Charles Tupper, Canada's high commissioner, and request that the Dominion Government legislate forthwith to ensure that each cheese imported of each box be branded with the date of making.
