Mr. S. P. Whiteway in his opening remarks reminded his audience that it took Gladstone in the year of 1886 three and a half hours to state the Irish Question, and pointed out how impossible was the task of stating it in the short time at his disposal The chief historic facts up to the present time were briefly outlined. The problem is in reality a racial one and the religious bitterness that now threat ens to overshadow the real issue has been brought about by British confiscation. Lloyd George's proposal is the most feasible yet suggested because the Bill of 1886 gave no representation in the Imperial Parliament. The Asquith Bill of 1915 led practically civil war, and the proposal of Lloyd George is along the lines on which Canada was given responsible government in 1840 and the Dominion of Canada was formed. Australia and South Africa were also formed on these lines, and hence the model on which the Empire will be federated.


