"The day after her discovery there was an explosion in the boilerroom, resulting in the death of two of the crew, while others were injured. Then, when approaching Iceland, we got a disappointment in a wireless mesage

when, in the neighbourhood of Flore, the Kaiser-I-Hind struck an unchart-ed obstruction below water, but very little damage was done, and after a call at Bergen the voyage was con-tinued to Leith. Here the captain sent the girl stowaway ashore to be dealt with, and after proceeding to Holland and Belgium the Kaiser-I-Hind duly arrived at Tilbury.

"Here the American passengers learnt that the Mauretania, the ship in which many of them had hoped to re-turn to New York, had been on fire at Southampton and her sailing had been cancelled. Many of them, I believe, are still in London waiting to fix up their passages. The girl "Jonah" is not a very popular subject with them"

The stowaway is described as an exceptionally tall pretty girl with large dark eyes, jet black hair, and an extremely vivacious manner. The women on board the Kaiser-I-Hind made a collection of clothing among them-

a collection of crothing among them-selves and fitted her up with some beautiful garments.

"When we first saw her she was dressed very humbly," said one of the passengers, "but it was not long be-fore she came into dinner in smart evening clothes which had been given to her.

"She was not a bit embarrassed by her position—she took her place among the rest of us with perfect equanimity. She played the plano and sang very well."
