Pharmacy Board Meeting.



Household Notes.

Pineapple and orange pies are a delightful change from the ordinary pie.

Boil young green onions in salted water and serve on toast with cream sauce.

A cup of chopped prunes added to gingerbread give it a holiday interest.

The omelet pan should be perfectly smooth, so that the omelet will not stick.

Cream cheese dressing is appropriate with a salad made from green vegetables.

Young chicken are nice cooked en casserole with potatoes, carrots, peas and onions.

The grated rind of 1/2 a lemon and a little cinnamon and nutmeg improve Brown Betty.

Asparagus tips served with omelet makes one of the most enjoyed Spring dishes.

Raisin cream pie should be topped just before serving with sweetened whipped cream.

Use a pitcher to fill small jelly glasses, and the hot jelly will not spill over the edge.

The soup for luncheon should be served in bouillon cups, and eaten with bouillon spoons.

Dice a ripe tomato and stir it into the omelet mixture just before putting it in the pan.

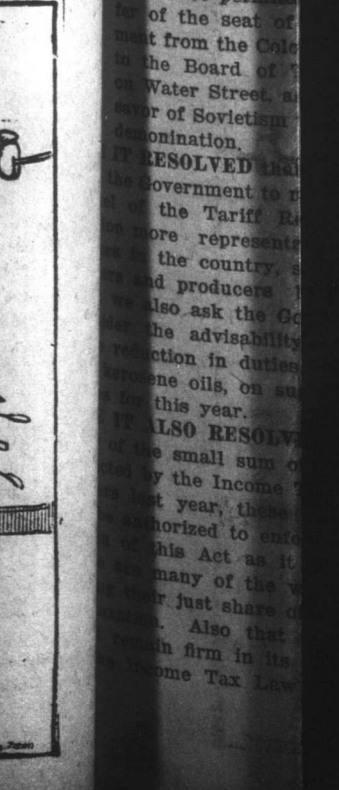
