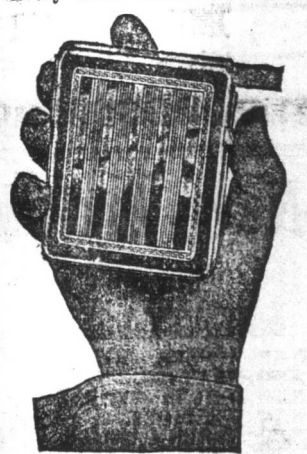

"London spent yesterday out of doors," says the London Chronicle. "It was a perfect Sunday for games. Every private cricket ground, bowling green, and tennis ground was occupied. All players finished quite strong though the Stars were a trifle tired in the second period was gruelling. TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

GERMANY'S HUGE DEBT.
BERLIN, July 29.
Germany's floating debt increased by four billion eight hundred million marks in the second ten days of July and is now more than three hundred billion marks.

SUBMARINES MISSING.
LOS ANGELES, July 29.
Four U.S. submarines, which left here Tuesday for Hampton Roads as part of a flotilla of twelve scheduled for reconnaissance duty in the Pacific, and missing off the lower California Coast, south of Ensenada.

GEDDES MAY GO.
WASHINGTON, July 29.
Rumors are in circulation here that Sir Auckland Geddes, British Ambassador to the United States, may accept a peerage and resign his Ambassadorship. It is suggested that the change in Ambassador might benefit Canada as it is known that Geddes is unfavorable to the appointment of a Canadian Ambassador to Washington.

CLAMORING FOR COAL.
CARDIFF, July 29.
There is no statement in the coal boom with Canadian and United States markets clamor. Prospective buyers are asking for immediate delivery but most collieries have disposed of their reserve and should the strike in the U.S. be settled at once prosperity is assured until the end of September.

NO REDUCTIONS.
PARIS, July 29.
Germany has been given ten days in refusing to reduce the monthly payment of the Allied clearing offices in refusing to reduce the monthly payments made by the government to the Allies for debts contracted by German Nationals with Allied Nationals prior to the outbreak of the war.

POINCARÉ UNPERTURBED.
PARIS, July 29.
Unperturbed by rumors on Friday that an attempt was being plotted in German Monarchistic circles to assassinate him, Premier Poincaré is planning to carry out his original intention of participating in the unveiling of the War Memorial in the Argonne to-morrow near his country home, Sampigny.

INSURGENTS CAPTURED.
DUBLIN, July 29.
The National Army report announces the capture of the village of Brure, two miles from Kilmallock, together with the insurgent population of the village, their arms and ammunition. Insurgents had established a strong position there after the retreat from Limerick. Glenveagh Castle, for some time a stronghold of the insurgents in County Donegal, was captured yesterday by National troops and the garrison made prisoners.
