WRITE ROMANCE OF NEW
FOUNDLAND.

Captain Wallace with "Viking
Blood", "Blue Water" and other books
to his credit, is seriously considering
the advisability of sojourning for a
time in Newfoundland, for the pur-
pose of portraying in a romantic and
attractive manner the life, industries
and the romances of the oldest colony.
Leading publishers of the United

States and Canada have agreed in ad-
vance to issue this work, which will
eventually be re-issued in Great
Britain, Australia and other countries,
thus duplicating the desirable con-
ditions which have already been ob-
tained by Capt. Wallace's previous
novels.

Referring to the proposed un-
dertaking, Mr. Wallace writes as follows:
"With regard to the epic story of
Newfoundland, I have been turning
this over in my mind. The back-
ground is there and the characters
are there. I have many already in

mind. There are the Banks fisher-
men and the spring sealers, the "rum
runners" of St. Pierre & Miquelon,
and the men who run dried fish across
to Portugal, Spain and the Levant in
small schooners, also down to the
West Indies and the Brazils. I could
put a character through all these and
give a patriotic tinge to him by hav-
ing him a Naval Reservist and one of
the North Sea Patrol (I have had four
or five of these men as crew with me
—all "sea boat" crews) in examina-
tion service during the war. Great
boat-men. Lower away in a gale of

wind. All the Newfoundland Re-
servists were placed in this work.)
"The Banksman of Avalon" or some
such title. As Editor of Fishing Ma-
gazines for 10 years I have had to keep
close tab on Newfoundland activities
and would make no breaks. But—
and here's my thoughts on the sub-
ject.

"If I undertook to write a story on
this, I would want it to be the best
ever—the epic story of the Grand
Banks and the Newfoundland fisher-
men. While I would be more than
glad to have you point out what is
necessary for the screen, and would
endeavour in every way possible to
incorporate them, yet I wouldn't want
to append my name to any story,
which is palpably a series of screen-
able incidents hung together and dis-
handed up as a novel. I'd be damned for
all time then. When I write a story,
I must live it and put into it the best
that is in me. You can appreciate my
point of view on this.

"As far as a film is concerned, I be-
lieve a Newfoundland film would go
big. It would be a great off-set to the
Labrador stories and the pictures of
sterile, bleak and barren, fog and
ice-bound coasts, which Dr. Groutill
and others have given the world.
Where is there a prettier place for
foliage and water than Humber Val-
ley in N.F. It's worthy of a Govern-
ment subsidy to refute that impres-
sion."

Big Welcome
to Bluenose.

WAS TOWED IN HARBOR AS AMER-
ICAN BOATS WERE LEAVING
FOR TO-DAY'S RACE.

GLoucester, Mass., Oct. 14.—The
schooner championship of the United
States fleet resumed their contest to-
day, after having welcomed the big
Nova Scotian schooner, which had
been missing for several days.
The Bluenose, sails furled, had ap-
peared outside the harbor as the first
of the fleet going out to see the start
of to-day's United States elimination
race passed the breakwater. She was
in tow of the Canadian cruised Pat-
riot, which had lost her in a fog off
Sable Island two days ago, and found
her again off Cape Ann last night. The
defending champion was given a rous-
ing welcome by foghorns and sirens.
H.M.C.S. Patriot, Lieut.-Commander
G. C. Jones dropped anchor in Glou-
cester Harbor at 4.30 yesterday, to the
salute of American war vessels here
for the elimination races.

The Bluenose, made fast to the end
of a 700-foot towline, parted the har-
bor about 2 o'clock Wednesday morn-
ing. A gale was blowing and the fog
was thick. Communication was kept

up between the Bluenose and the
Patriot by means of a bottle contain-
ing the messages, sent back and forth
along the towline. No indication was
had that the tow line was weakening
and the first intimation Commander
Jones had that the line had parted
was when the destroyer suddenly shot
forward as she was relieved of the
strain caused by the heavy Nova Scot-
ian dragging at the end of the hawser.
