Head of Shipbuilding Firm Explains Industrial Paralysis

Lunenburg Banker Reports Loss of Two Nfld. Fishermen—France to Negotiate Funding of Her Debt to U.S.A.—Royal Assent Given to Gold Standard Bill.

BRITISH INDUSTRY PARALYZED BY UNION RESTRICTIONS.
 MONTREAL, May 13. A gloomy picture of conditions in England is drawn by Sir Alfred Yarrow, head of Yarrow and Company, shipbuilders, who is in Montreal today. He declared Germany can build as good ships as England, though few British shipping men would acknowledge the fact, and that construction in Germany was about twenty per cent cheaper because the Germans worked more hours and accepted less pay. "Restrictions caused by trades unions in England are paralyzing industry," he said; "under present conditions progress is impossible."

NFLD. FISHERMEN LOST.
 CANSO, May 12. The Lunenburg fishing schooner Marion Elizabeth, Captain John Westerman, arrived in port this evening with flag half mast for two fishermen who went astray in their dory while the vessel was fishing in Quero Bank, St. John's. The men were from Newfoundland.—Ephraim Purdy and Philip Hammon.

INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES ACT RESTORED.
 OTTAWA, May 13. The Bill restoring the Industrial Disputes Investigation Act, formerly known as the Lemieux Act, recently declared ultra vires of the Federal Government because of its encroachment upon Provincial jurisdiction, passed through all stages of the House today with three amendments. The new bill established the principles of the Lemieux Act, but restricts its application to matters not within the jurisdiction of the Provinces; but there is a further provision which enables any Province to obtain its advantage on application.

FRANCE TO FUND WAR DEBT TO U.S.A.
 PARIS, May 13. The first active negotiations for funding the French war debt to the United States will begin within fifteen days, it was learned authoritatively today.

NEW RUNNERS DRIVEN FROM NEW ENGLAND COAST.
 WASHINGTON, May 13. The Dry Navy is reported to have driven the rum fleet from New York and New Jersey coasts, but to-day prohibition forces find themselves compelled to tighten the defenses along the Pacific shore and Mexican and Canadian borders. The latest development is the appearance of five 10,000 ton liquor ships, flying British and Canadian flags off Southern California, reported in despatches from San Diego. One, the S.S. Gertrude, formerly was a member of the New York rum squadron.

CROSSBOW WON NEWMARKET STAKES.
 NEWMARKET, Eng., May 13. Lord Astor's Crossbow, out of Gay Crusader, by Popinjay, won the Newmarket Stakes of one thousand pounds, run here to-day.

44 DEATHS IN BABY FARMS.
 NEW YORK, May 13. Records of the Bureau of Vital Statistics were made public to-day, showing 44 babies died in two "baby farms," conducted by Mrs. Helen Auguste Gesh Volk here since 1918.

PASSED HUGE ICEBERG.
 LONDON, May 13. Passengers on the steamer Aurania, on arriving in Liverpool yesterday, from Montreal, reported having seen a huge iceberg off Cape Race, on May 8th. The berg loomed up suddenly out of dense fog only 100 or 150 feet from the ship. Captain Peel, the commander, was presented with an address signed by all the passengers, expressing admiration for his caution and discretion, and the able manner in which he manoeuvred the vessel.

FRENCH OUTPOSTS REVICTUALIZED.
 RABAT, May 13. French troops to-day revictualized, without meeting assistance, two of the outposts surrounded by Abd-el Krim's invading Rifians, the official communication said.

CANADA IMPORTING POTATOES.
 OTTAWA, May 13. Canada imported 11,057,443 pounds of potatoes from United States in four months, ended April 30th, last and paid \$127,643 for them, with duty at the rate of 35 cents per hundred pounds.

GOLD STANDARD BILL GIVEN ROYAL ASSENT.
 LONDON, May 13. Royal assent was given to-day to the Bill providing for return to the gold standard, which passed through the Lords without discussion.

VETERAN TELEGRAPHER DIES.
 NORTH SYDNEY, N.S., May 13. A noted figure in the telegraphic world died to-day, in the person of Samuel H. Gordon Strudwick, who passed away at noon. Born in the south of England, he came to America in 1882 as an expert to install the telegraphic system from Chicago to Frisco. He was sent to North Sydney in 1899 and was superannuated from the cable service in 1910. He was 72 years old.

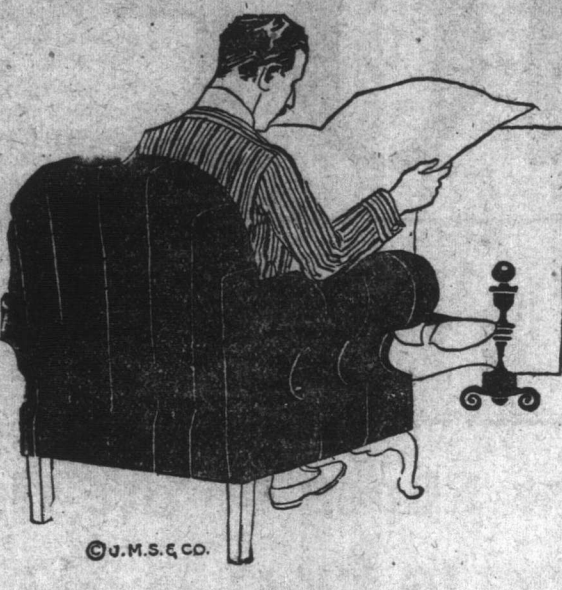
