

# THE LATE MURDER IN OSPREY.

## Arrest of the Murderer. He Hangs Himself in his Cell.

TO EVENING MERCURY.
Owen Sound, Feb. 11, 1873. Last evening two constable arrived here, having in charge the man Beggs from the Township of Osprey, on a charge of murdering his wife in bed the

previous Saturday.

He was placed in his cell in the gaol about five o'clock, and at eight was found dead, he having taken a sheet from the bed, tied one end round the grating above the door, then a turn round his neck, holding the other end in his hand.

When found he was still warm, and rasping the end of the sheet firmly, his head not being much more than two or

three feet from the ground.

The prisoners in the adjoining cells did not hear any noise.

An inquest is being held to-day.
