FOUGHT INDIANS IN THE ANCIENT DAYS

A British Columbia Pioneer Prospector
and Miner Tells of the Conditions
As They Were.

(Vancouver Province.)

There is no more picturesque figure in British Columbia today than Edward Stout, better known as "Ned" or "Daddy" Stout, pioneer prospector and miner. For upwards of half a century he has breathed the invigorating air of this coast province and his career has been a remarkable one. In a quiet little cottage just back of the station house in North Bend he is willing away the autumnal days of his life and his only joy is in his home or in reciting the thrilling incidents he encountered when, with others of his class, he braved trails through the forests so that he might penetrate the wilderness of the great interior and do his part in revealing to the world the wonderful resources nature has placed here for man.

He and others, an angry, torrent of water, or an almost impenetrable bog of rock or brush to remove with an occasional battle with a wild bear or a bloody conflict with Indians—one can hardly comprehend the hardships and dangers braved. "Ned" Stout is one of the survivors of the terrible massacre perpetrated by the Indians along the banks of the Fraser in 1858. "Vividly" he can recall that awful conflict on Slaughter Flat, the known as "Mariners' Bend." Just above Kefer's, with several ugly scars on his arms and body, where Indian arrows or bullets cut him down, he has tangible evidence of the tragedy.

Ambushed by Indians
There were 20 in his party all bent on finding the precious gold. All through the canyon they had experienced trouble with the natives, but it was not until they were in the vicinity of Jackson Mountain that they learned of the Indians' determination to kill the white men. Stout's partner, Jas. McLennan, leader of the party, was friendly with a Indianman and the latter was warned them. As an army will conduct a flank movement on the battlefield this little band of prospectors decided to beat a retreat around Jackson Mountain in the hope that the Indians who were then pressing their way up the river, would pass without detecting them. But the Indians had decreed against them. The flank movement executed, the party was working its way down the river when from across the stream there came a fusillade of bullets. In speaking of the fight Kennedy said:

"We had 12 double-barrelled shot-guns and six Kentucky rifles and decided to fight, though we were certainly outnumbered. One by one my comrades dropped, and as they fell we threw them into the river, so that the Indians would not get their bodies. One poor fellow retreated into a cave, at the mouth of which he laid his pile of gold. The Indians dragged the unfortunate man into the open to rid him with bullets."

Captain Snider came over the hills from Yale with 200 men and rescued us on China Bar below North Bend. There were only five of us left.

"Yes, I was badly wounded and it was only through grit and determination that I kept up. Once in the west, three times on the arm and once on the abdomen the arrows and bullets of the Indians found me, but I kept plucky comrades and oftentimes when I felt like giving up the fight they urged me on."

Asked concerning the Indians who had attacked them, Stout said that a few of them were still living and he believed the leader of the band was still in that vicinity.

"It was nothing for us to have a fight with the Indians," he continued, "but the trouble was settled when Captain Snider made peace with them at Lytton on August 11, 1858, though many whites had before that been murdered."

Born in Bavaria, Germany, Stout left home in the fall of 1846 and after a voyage of 42 days landed in New York. He drifted to Milwaukee, where he remained for three years. He then started overland for California, Minn. California, for several years, he saw much of life in the California gold camps.

In 1858 he came north to Bellingham Bay. In the party was the late Archie Macdonald, one of British Columbia's best-known pioneers. They built a boat and started for the Fraser River, reaching Yale on May 26, 1858.

NO EXERCISE AFTER WORK London Physician Says Office Workers Are Better Without Exercise

London, May 5.—A distinguished London physician, Dr. Alexander Bryce, has started a discussion by asserting that office workers should not take exercise after their day's work. He says:

"The root reason is that, though head work is not exercise in the sense that it develops the body, it most decidedly is exercise in that it quickly induces 'fat' and physical lassitude. So it is almost pathetic for a man to expect any good to come from taking more exercise when the exercise involved in the day's work has already tired him out."

"One takes it that young people have had sufficient outdoor exercise to reasonably develop their frames before beginning office work. So when once they have started in the office in earnest it is much better for them to realize at once that their days of physical strain are over and done with and that henceforth they must confine these efforts to week-ends and holidays. They can follow this advice calmly enough, for it does not mean at all that they are going to deteriorate suddenly into wrecks."

"The body and system easily adjust themselves to circumstances, even to overcivilized and consequently, rather unnatural circumstances, and indoor head workers will soon find that a very decent state of health can be maintained with little or no apparent exercise."

"For all people living under the undoubted inconvenience of earning a livelihood a most excellent rule of thumb in regard to this much misunderstood question of work and exercise is the following: Never try to mix the two, and stop exercising at once if you do not find that it gives you real enjoyment."

"And I need only add," he concluded, "that the rational way, home after a day's work in the office is by train, tram or omnibus, not walking, and that the proper time for real exercise is when no thought of work need intervene for at least forty-eight hours after the exercise has stopped."

BRITISH AUTHOR
ON PRESS OF U. S.

Says Big Dailies Reflect Desire to Exploit Multitude

London, May 5.—James Edward Rogers, author of a book entitled "The American Newspaper," published by the University of Chicago Press, has either been egregiously mis-reviewed in "The Author," the official organ of the powerful English Society of Authors, or else he has wilfully done much to hurt the reputation of the American press generally over here, where so little is known about American newspapers. The president of the Authors' Society is Thomas Hardy, and such men as Maurice Hewitt, Israel Zangwill, Anthony Hope, Bernard Shaw and Sir Arthur Pinero are on its committee. Whatever its official organ says is probably read by most of the principal English writers.

In this month's issue the Author observes that if all of what Rogers says about American papers is true then they may, with a few honorable exceptions, "be divided into two classes"—newspapers which one would not willingly touch with a pair of tongs, newspapers which one would not willingly touch with anything but a pair of tongs. They suppress, doctor, or even invent news to serve the interests of politicians or private interests. Their sensationalism panders to the lowest instincts of their subscribers."

The Author is good enough to observe that this indictment is not its own, but that of Mr. Rogers and adds:

"As he assures us that he examined fifteen thousand newspapers in order to form them, he is at all events well documented. The fault, however, cannot be attributed solely to the innate wickedness of editors, or even of proprietors. The deficiencies of the law of the land are largely responsible. If judges were inflexible, if the law of libel were effective, and if contempt of court were properly punished, many of the worst features of American journalism would disappear. Even so, however, it would remain a disappointment."

SPAIN MAY FACE CRISIS

Republican Party Conducts Violent Campaign Against the Throne.

London, May 3.—The Times draws attention to the unsatisfactory political conditions prevailing in Spain and Portugal. To all outward seeming matters in both kingdoms are fairly tranquil.

A general election is pending in Spain. The discussion was under consideration by the cabinet early last week. It will reveal something in the direction in which the public mind is working.

The recent banquet in Barcelona showed how far the school of Spanish Republicans is ready to go. Some of the speeches made on that occasion were downright treason by the law of all civilized states.

Senor Lerroux, the most fiery of the orators on that occasion, has been making a political tour. He has visited many of the large cities, and even country districts.

The tone of his rhetoric is supposed to show that everywhere he found the masses ripe for mischief. But the Government has not apparently taken any steps against him.

MAY CLOSE PLATFORM FROM THE PUBLIC

Some Effort Being Made to Prevent the Crowding at the C. P. R. Station Platform.

Owing to the heavy increase in business at the local passenger station, Depot Master Burleigh said yesterday afternoon that he will try to make arrangements to prevent crowding on the platform when trains arrive and depart, although he does not know yet just how he will do it.

"I know that friends like to gather at the train to see their acquaintances as they come in or go out, but the traveling public must be considered," he said. "It is not fair that a man who happens to be late in purchasing a ticket should miss a train because he could not force his way through a crowd in time. This jamming on the platform is unpleasant all around, in some of the large cities people are excluded from the platform entirely."
