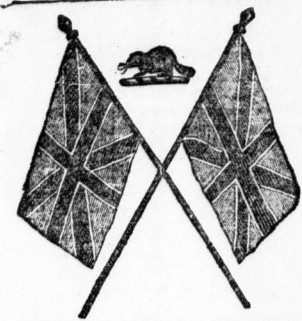

THE DREADFUL GRIP.

How a Person in Ordinary Health May

Avail of a Serious Attack.

In a mild and recent attack, the victim being in ordinary health otherwise, the trouble can be controlled by very simple means. If needed, an active cathartic, rectified in hot water, made still better by the addition of mustard, drunk freely by the addition of quinine in two to five grain doses every three or four hours. Keep this up for three or four days. If whisky has not already been taken, a little now will be of great advantage as a shield against relapse. In relapses or second or third attacks lie the greatest danger from grip. And it has a peculiar tendency to return after once visiting a patient, and at each return its effects are more prostrating. It is strikingly true when the disease has passed into a chronic state. The aged or feeble with low resisting forces, die quickly. It has yet to be learned what the final result or results will be in those cases with low forces sufficient to contend against a fatal result. The disease has been enough to prevent serious inroads upon comfort and health. In many cases this feature of the grip is a perplexing matter. Patient neither dies nor gets well, but remains in that condition to relapse at any moment. A little on the style of the old-fashioned cure, as much good as doing harm in one case as it did in the other.—(Medical Free Press.)

A Mexican War Veteran Dead.

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—Col. George G. Minor died suddenly in his home yesterday. He was well known as a soldier, having served both in the Mexican and civil wars. He drew up the articles of agreement between the United States and Mexico at the end of the Mexican war—the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo. Minor, who was then aide to Gen. Scott, spoke French and Spanish fluently, and acted as interpreter for Gen. Scott during the entire war.

A Murderer Shot by Sheriff's Officers.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Feb. 4.—Jas. Odum was killed by a sheriff's posse near Merrell station. Last Friday Odum, who lives in West Carroll parish, La., went to Merrell, Ark., to see a friend, and was shot by a posse of sheriff's officers. The murderer escaped. The sheriff, with a posse, pursued Odum and found him Monday night in the woods near Merrell station. He resisted arrest and fired on them. The fire was returned and Odum died.

Death of Mayor Goode of Guilford.

GUILFORD, Ont., Feb. 3.—Mr. Thomas Goode, mayor of Guilford, died tonight of pneumonia supervening a gripe. His age was 42 years. The terrible attack of pneumonia, from which he had been suffering for the past few days, developed with great rapidity yesterday. At 10 o'clock he pronounced the case hopeless. For several hours he lay in a state of coma and the stimulants applied failed to revive him. The news has cast a gloom over the whole community. Goode was a well-known miller, and was perhaps the most popular man in this district. A couple of years ago he was elected mayor of the Royal City, the honorable position which he held till the hour of his death, while only in the prime of life. Mr. Goode was an ardent admirer of cricket and was president of the Ontario Cricket Association.

UNITED STATES.

Two additional cases of smallpox have just been discovered in New York.

The situation in the grain blockade at Kansas City is practically unchanged.

There are 2,000 entries and over 5,000 birds at the New York poultry show that opened yesterday.

John J. Schilling, 60 years old, inventor of the artificial cement sidewalk and fire-proof brick, died yesterday in New York.

The Trunk Line Executive Committee decided to give free transportation to a reasonable amount of food products for the starving Russians.

There are fears for the safety of the steamer Napier, which left Gibraltar Jan. 31, with a cargo of fruit for New York. The Napier's crew numbered 27 men.

The trial of Maurice B. Curtis, known on the stage as "Sam'l o' Posen," for the murder of Police Officer Alexander Grant began Wednesday at San Francisco.

The case of Brown, Stewes & Clark, failed woolen merchants of Boston, which has been in the Insolvency Court for two years, has been settled by the acceptance by the creditors of 7 per cent. on the \$3,000,000 of liabilities.

When mail wagon No. 36, which left the New York postoffice at 7 o'clock with the mail for Hoboken, N. J., arrived at Hoboken it was found to be empty. The missing pouches were for Buffalo, Emporium, Mount Morris, Elmira, Waverly and Saratoga.

The Northern Pacific has determined to meet Canadian Pacific competition in making half fare rates for stock men returning from Manitoba points to points in Ontario and Eastern Canada. The Wisconsin Central will join with the Northern Pacific in meeting these rates.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The Anti-Slavery Committee Act was ratified by the United States at the Foreign Ministry in Brussels yesterday.

A crowd of London workmen out of employment, pillaged a number of bakeries in the city yesterday. Many were arrested.

General Isidore Pierre Semitz has died at Paris. He was born in 1820 and served in the campaigns in Africa, the Crimea and Italy.

The Portuguese Cortes refused to discuss Senator Almeida's proposal to sell the Portuguese colonies to relieve the country's financial distress.

POLITICAL POINTS.

The Soulanges Election—West Huron Conservatives Nominates Hon. J. C. Patterson.

W. R. Northrup, Belleville, received the Conservative nomination for the Commons in East Hastings Wednesday.

The Soulanges (Que.) election took place Wednesday. Sir John (Con.) was elected by about 100 majority over Mr. Mousseau (Lib.).

Three of the candidates for the Commons in Halifax—Dr. Farrell, T. Kenny and J. E. Stairs—are confined to the house with grip.

The Nova Scotia Legislature is summoned to meet March 3.

Hon. J. C. Patterson was nominated on Wednesday for the Commons by the Conservatives of West Huron.

The writ for the bye-election in South Ontario has been issued. Nominations will be Feb. 13; polling, Feb. 20.

Speaking of the rumor that he had resigned, C. H. Mackintosh, M.P., says he will continue to represent the city during the coming session, but will retire during the following recess.

Returning Officer Geo. B. Towers has made the official declaration in the Lincoln election, which showed that Wm. Gibson was elected by a majority of 232. There were 56 rejected votes and 33 spoiled ballots.

VENGEANCE EXTRAORDINARY.

The Penalty that Mahmud Khan Paid for Being One of His Wives.

A vast amount has been written about the submissiveness of Oriental wives, and few exceptions to the rule of passive endurance among them are noted. A short time ago, however, an Oriental wife behaved in a manner, which has been an appalling manner, as told by his victim in an appalling manner.

Mahmud Khan, with his favorite wives, Aysha and Khairashah, was on his way to Mecca. One night, between Bolan and Sindh, his tent was pitched opposite that of a German tourist, who observed what proceeded within and thus was able to reveal the details in a subsequent tragedy.

At bedtime Mahmud Khan threw himself on his couch and called in Aysha, to give him the usual rubbing. Aysha, however, failed to treat her lord to his satisfaction, and snatching a piece of wood from the ground he struck her a savage blow on the back.

The young girl, hardly 16 years old, started under the blow, and, to the surprise of the wedding tourist, made a slight, almost imperceptible, movement, as if to return it, while her teeth and glowered at the ground. Mahmud Khan evidently remarked her look and went to sleep, while the injured Aysha stole away.

The life caravan moved on the next day, and in the time arrived at Jacobabad, whence Mahmud Khan and his two wives set out for the last part of their journey before embarking. Their way to the next city lay through a dense forest. Two days later Aysha and Khairashah returned to Jacobabad alone. They behaved strangely, and gave contradictory and confused answers to all inquiries after Mahmud Khan.

They were detained and a search was made for their master. He was found, naked and dead, at the foot of the tree, with a large cut on his head, and the two girls confessed to the deed and confessed the death of Mahmud Khan's father.

He was dying when found, but was able to explain that his wives had dragged him, tied him while unconscious to the tree, smothered his body with wet sugar to attract the ants, and after stirring up the ants left him to die.

Mahmud Khan lived but three days after the rescue. Aysha and Khairashah were condemned to hard labor for life, but hanged themselves immediately.

Suddenly Summoned

Unexpected Death of Sir Morell Mackenzie.

The Distinguished Doctor Dies from Bronchitis.

All the Elder's Specie and Mail Bags Secured.

Sir Michael Hicks-Beach Admits the Importance of the Rosendale Reverse.

LONDON, Feb. 3.—Sir Morell Mackenzie, the distinguished physician, whose serious illness with bronchitis was announced a few days ago, died to-day. Sir Morell Mackenzie was born in Leytonstone, Essex, in 1837, and was educated at the London Hospital Medical College and in Paris and Vienna. He was the author of numerous publications on laryngological subjects, and in particular of a systematic treatise, in two volumes, on diseases of the throat and nose, which is acknowledged to be a standard work. Dr. Mackenzie was also the author of monographs on diphtheria, hay fever, and of an article on specialism in medicine, which appeared in the Fortnightly Review in 1885, and which excited considerable attention.

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Late Canadian News

Suicide of a Young Farmer Near Owen Sound.

Hastings Lumber Camp Broken Up by Grip—A Man Persecutes a Woman Veteran.

A Fredericton (N. B.) barber is charged with having persecuted a woman veteran at the last mayoralty election there.

Some lumber camps in Hastings county have been broken up by the gripe. Four deaths occurred in one camp from the disease.

Hon. Alex. Mackenzie, M.P., slipped and fell on the icy walk near his house Tuesday. He sustained a severe strain, but will be all right in a day or two.

Eighteen employees of the Toronto Waterworks Department were yesterday given the option of a month's notice or a month's pay. Thirteen of them took the month's pay and left.

The explosion of a boiler on Wednesday afternoon caused a fire, the Ottawa Vindicator office on Simcoe street. Some \$2,000 damage was done to the stock and machinery.

It is said the Quebec Royal Commissioners have sent to the Lieutenant-Governor their first report. It comprises all the evidence taken at the trial of the late David Long, a farmer aged 29, residing on St. Vincent road, near Woodford, committed suicide last night by taking strychnine, purchased for the ostensible purpose of poisoning foxes. Domestic troubles are alleged to be the cause of the rash act.

General Manager Greer, of the Ontario Express and Transportation Company, has denied the report circulated by a mercantile agency that a demand of assignment had been made on his company. "We intend to preserve the company's charter at all events," said he.

James L. Tait, of St. Catharines, was one of the passengers on the stranded steamer Elmer.

David Long, 29 years old, living near Owen Sound, has succeeded by means of poison. His brother George also took his own life in the same manner several years ago.

The Bishop of Saskatchewan and Calgary leave for England this month to raise a fund for the endowment of the diocese of Calgary. A minimum sum of \$50,000 is required. The see had fallen. The remainder of the mail bags had been landed.

DAHOMYANS ON THE WARPATH.

PARIS, Feb. 3.—The Temps has a dispatch from Senegal saying that natives of Dahomey have ravaged the country around Popo and have captured 3,000 slaves. The inhabitants have sought shelter in German territory. Trade is at a standstill.

DEATH OF A LEADING DIVINE.

BELFAST, Feb. 3.—Rev. Hugh Hanna, D.D., pastor of St. Anne's Church, Belfast, died here to-day. He was one of the leaders of the Irish Presbyterianism.

SIR MICHAEL HICKS-BEACH IS HOPFUL.

LONDON, Feb. 3.—Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, president of the Board of Trade, delivered a speech at Bristol this evening. He stated that the Government meant to have a working session in the House of Commons on the 10th inst. The result of the Rosendale election was a serious defeat for the Government, but it did not necessarily imply defeat in the general elections
