THE WEATHER.

Toronto, Ont., March 4—11 p.m.—
The depression which moved out to sea-
yesterday from the Middle Atlantic States
has reappeared off the Nova Scotia coast.
An important storm. Storm signals were
erected up along the coast and in the Gulf
of St. Lawrence. It is now blowing in this
direction; an easterly gale, accompanied
by snow and rain, in this district. Fair
weather and decreased pressure are general
in Ontario and Quebec. In the Northwest
it is fair and mild.

Minimum and maximum temperatures:
Calgary, 20°-60°; Qu'Appelle, 10°-40°;
Winnipeg, 16°-34°; Port Arthur, 20°-36°;
Toronto, 14°-29°; Kingston, 6°-25°; Mon-
treal, 6°-22°; Quebec, 10° below-18°;
Halifax, 16°-34°.

TO-DAY'S PROBABILITIES.

Toronto, March 4—1 a.m.—The indica-
tions for the next 24 hours for the lower
lakes region (covering the peninsula and
as far east as Belleville) are: Fair
to cloudy, with light showers in the
morning. It is now blowing in this
direction; an easterly gale, accompanied

in Ontario and Quebec. In the Northwest
it is fair and mild.

day at 11:45 a.m. by the Deputy Minister
of Marine from the meteorological office at
Toronto: "The Atlantic coast and Gulf
are warned for an easterly gale; storm now
moving from the Atlantic."
