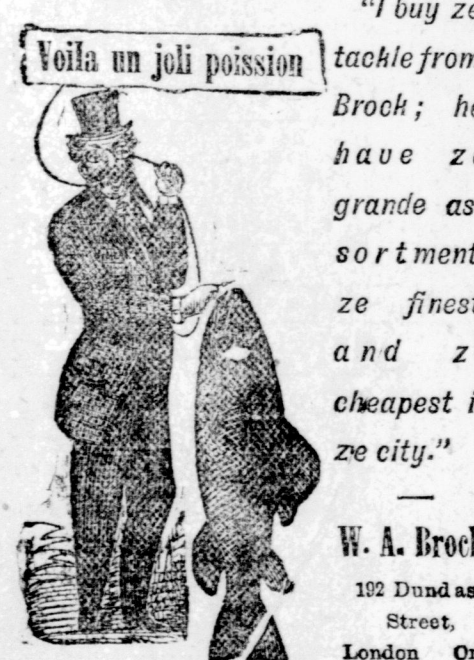

—The firemen have been granted per-
mission to turn out for the Labor Day pro-
cession.

—The Grand Trunk had their station
stoves burning last night for the first time
this season. The air was very chilly.

—A new platform is being laid at the
entrance to the court house. The old one
was built when the building was erected.

—The foundation has been laid for a
handsome residence for Mr. Jonathan
Magee on the corner of Hyman and Wel-
lington streets.

—In the Kirkpatrick match yesterday at
Ottawa, Staff-Sergeant Goodwin and Maj.
Hayes, of the Seventh Battalion, made 85
points each and 84 each.

—Among those on the platform at the
Liberal picnic at Port Stanley, was Daniel
Gorman, of Port Stanley, who has reached
the patriarchal age of 96 years.

—Dr. McKay, the returned missionary
from Formosa, leaves in a day or two on a
trip to Scotland. He will return again to
Canada before leaving for the missionary
field.

—Street watering contractors say they
will make nothing out of their prices this
year. They have labored continuously
since May 1 to keep the streets in a proper
condition.

—Frank Rourke was taken to the Cen-
tral Prison yesterday afternoon, where he
will spend six months for vagrancy. Bailiff
English was in charge, and had also four
colored prisoners from Chatham.

—Thomas W. Foster has been discharged
from custody. Foster was arrested on
Wednesday night on a charge of having
turned Mrs. Vandever from her home
just east of the city limits. A settlement
satisfactory to all parties was reached.

—Subscriber (Walker's).—Labor Day is
a Dominion holiday just as the 24th of May
and 1st of July are. All Government
offices will be closed, and also the banks.
Whether public schools in the rural regions
will or will not be closed may depend
on the trustees until the School Act is
changed.

—Mrs. George Burns, sen., and Mr.
George Burns, the Dundas street clothier,
are in St. Louis, Mo. They went on re-
ceipt of a telegram announcing the serious
illness of Mr. A. B. Carruthers, Mrs.
Burns' brother. Mr. Carruthers was a
native of London, but for 30 years has
lived in New York and St. Louis. He is
now engaged in the commission line.
Latest advices report him slightly im-
proved.

paper at what age are minors allowed to be
in and play in pool rooms, and to whom
are we to apply to prosecute in case of
children under the age playing to bring
proof to the extent of law? Yours, etc.,

Port Stanley, Aug. 30, 1894.

[NOTE.—The keeper of a licensed bil-
liard, pool or bagatelle room admitting a
minor under the age of 16 years thereto,
and allowing him to remain without the
consent of his parent or guardian, is sub-
ject to a fine not exceeding \$10 for first
offense and not exceeding \$20 for second
offense, to be imposed on summary con-
viction by a justice of the peace. Anyone
may be the prosecutor. There is no special
officer appointed for the purpose of enforce-
ing the act. Cap. 204 Revised Statutes of
Ontario. The village constable should act
on the facts being brought to his notice.—

THE DUTY ON SALT.

Canada Will Have to Pay Eight Cents

a Hundred.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 30.—Secretary
Carlisle has issued a circular to all col-
lectors of customs calling attention to para-
graph 608 of the new tariff act, which
admits salt free of duty, but provides that
the coverings in which it is imported shall
pay the same rate of duty as if imported
separately; and further "that if salt is im-
ported from any country which imposes a
duty upon salt exported from the United
States, then there shall be levied, paid and
collected upon such salt the rate of duty
existing prior to the passage of this act." That is 8 cents per 100 pounds.

The principal countries imposing a salt
duty are: Canada, Austria, Argentine,
Brazil, France, Germany, Mexico, Russia,
Australian provinces and Spain.

The Sealey Case.

TORONTO, Aug. 30.—The statement that
the Provincial authorities have decided to
take no further steps in regard to the case
of Charles Sealey, of Vienna, whose death
was caused by arsenical poisoning, is un-
true. Provincial Constable J. G. Clayton
has been working industriously on the case,
and the result of his investigations, to-
gether with the evidence and finding of
the coroner's jury, and the report of the
analysis made by Prof. Harrison, of Lon-
don, have been received at the Attorney-
General's department. Mr. John Cart-
wright, Deputy Attorney-General, says
the papers have been received at the
department, and he would undertake their
perusal tomorrow. The jury returned a
verdict attributing death to arsenical
poisoning, but it was not charged in the
verdict that any particular person was
guilty. Any action taken by the depart-
ment would be in the form of a notification
to the county crown attorney.
