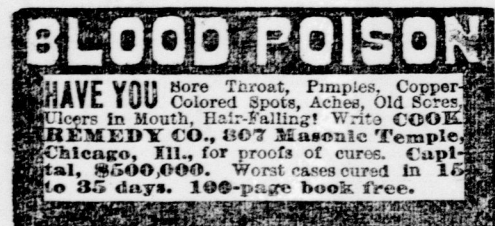

FINE AND VERY WARM.

Toronto, May 28—11 p.m.—The depression which was over Quebec last night has nearly disappeared, but it has caused showery weather today in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces. The depression in the west is moving slowly toward the lake region, while higher pressure with a cool wave is spreading over the Northwest Territories.
The minimum and maximum temperatures reported for today are: Edmonton, 30-52; Calgary, 32-46; Prince Albert, 38-40; Qu'Appelle, 40-66; Winnipeg, 52-74; Toronto, 42-79; Montreal, 48-62; Quebec, 46-54; Chatham, N. B., 60-73; Halifax, 52-55.
Toronto, May 29—1 a.m.—Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the lower lake region (covering the peninsula and as far east as Belleville) are: Fresh southerly winds; fine and very warm.

AN ELGIN PIONEER GONE.

Sudden Death of Mr. Daniel Macpherson, of Fingal—A Useful Life.

Mr. Daniel Macpherson, of Fingal, whose death occurred suddenly on Saturday, in his 79th year, was born in Helmsdale, Sutherlandshire, Scotland, Feb. 1, 1817. He came to Canada with his father in 1839, when three years of age, and first settled in Dunwich township, the family afterwards removing to Southwold township. When a young man he was engaged for some years in operating threshing machinery, and he and the late Hon. Arch. McKeellar, being among the first to introduce in this district improved machinery of this class. He was married in 1848 to Mary Ferguson, daughter of Duncan Ferguson, of Yarmouth township. Her death occurred in 1859.

In the year 1848 he, with Wm. Glasgow and Matthias Hovey, started the Fingal agricultural works, and engaged in the manufacture of agricultural implements, engines, saw and grist mill machinery, etc. After nearly fifteen years of successful business, they started a branch establishment at Clinton. Both factories are still actively carried on. The original partnership continued until dissolved by the death of Wm. Glasgow in 1882, when the Fingal business was purchased by deceased and his sons.

In addition to manufacturing, his fondness for farming pursuits, which adhered to him through life, led to his always being actively engaged in this line.

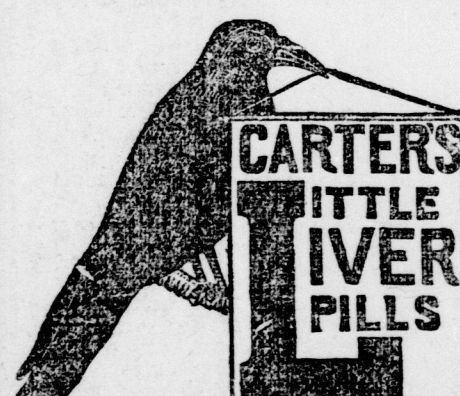
He was a man of the highest character and integrity, of generous disposition, and warmly attached to his friends.

Although of Conservative antecedents he was from his first participation in politics a staunch Liberal. He engaged actively in the early political contests of this district, and was an intimate friend and co-worker of the late Hon. Alexander MacKenzie, Hon. Geo. Brown and Hon. Arch. McKeellar in many hard-fought political battles in which they participated in this section.

In religion he was a Presbyterian and connected with the church of that denomination at Fingal, of which Rev. George Sutherland is pastor.

Seven sons and one daughter, Mrs. W. J. Coates, of Clinton, survive him. The funeral took place from his late residence to the Fingal cemetery on Tuesday, May 28.
