AN ELGIN PIONEER GONE.

Sudden Death of Mr. Daniel Macpherson, of Fingal-A Useful Life. Mr. Daniel Macpherson, of Fingal, whose death occurred suddenly on Saturday, in his 79th year, was born in Helmsdale, Sutherlandshire, Scotland, Feb. 1, 1817. He came to Canada with his father in 1820, when three years of age, and first settled in Dunwich township, the family afterwards removing to Southwold township. 
always being actively engaged in this He was a man of the highest character and integrity, of generous disposition, and warmly attached to his
