AGITATORS JAILED. The hearing of the charges of holding meetings and delivering intimidating speeches, in defiance of the police, brought against Conor O'Kelly, M.P., chairman of the Mayo county council, and several other officials of Mayo county, was concluded yesterday. O'Kelly was sentenced to two months' imprisonment, and four other defendants were sentenced to terms of imprisonment ranging from a fortnight to a month-all without hard labor. The court refused defendants leave

to appeal, as they refused to promise not to speak publicly in the interim. New York, Dec. 19.-Edward Moeran. New York Dec. 19.—Edward Moeran, counsel for Signor Marconi, said last night that Signor Marconi will go to Cornwall immediately, and that he intends to install there a plant of very large voltage. His poles have worked very unsatisfactorily, and the balloons and kites have not worked well. The pole which he had erected in Newfoundland is 130 feet high, and it cannot with stand a gale.
