### SOME DIFFICULTIES IN MARCONI'S WAY.

Masts Don't Withstand Wind and They're Expensive—He'll Build a Tower.

New York, Dec. 18.—Edward Moran, counsel for Signor Marconi, said last night that Signor Marconi will go to Cornwall immediately, and that he intends to install there a plant of very large voltage. His poles have worked very unsatisfactorily, and the balloons and kites have not worked well. The pole which he had erected in Newfoundland, is 150 feet high, and it cannot withstand a gale. The poles cost \$1,200 each, so that the expense of experimenting can readily be appreciated by anybody.

"He is engineering to reduce the height of the masts, in the hope that he will be able to operate successfully without such high poles; but until he has solved the problem of operating on surface level he will construct, for the purpose of his experiments, a tower which will be of such size that it cannot be blown down."

A French engineer named M. Souza, of Vity-sur-Seine, is reported to have made successful experiments with a motor-car pole.

## TROUBLE WITH ABDUL HAMID

France Again Threatening to Sever Relations With Turkey.

Conor O'Kelly, M.P., and Other Agitators Sent to Cells.

London and Globe Finance Corporation Assets Less Than Half the Liabilities—Church Decides to Canonize Joan of Arc.

London, Dec. 19.—Information has been received from Constantinople that M. Constans, the French minister, there, has again threatened to break off diplomatic relations with the Porte. The suspicious movements of Turkish troops in Tripoli, near the frontier of Tunis, is said to be the cause of the complications.

IN A HOLE.

During a meeting of the creditors of the London and Globe Finance Corporation today, the official receiver, Mr. Barnes, announced that the secured liabilities of the concern aggregated £1,142,000 (\$5,710,000), with apparently overvalued assets amounting to £424,000 (\$2,120,000). At a subsequent meeting of the shareholders, Mr. Barnes said there would be nothing left for them. Apparently, none of the directors, with the exception of Mr. Whitaker Wright, knew anything of the enormous transactions of the corporation. The balance sheet for 1900 was a work of art.

AGITATORS JAILED.

The hearing of the charges of holding meetings and delivering inflammatory speeches in defiance of the police, brought against Conor O'Kelly, M.P., chairman of the Mayo county council, and several other officials of Mayo county, was concluded yesterday. O'Kelly was sentenced to two months' imprisonment, and four other defendants were sentenced to terms of imprisonment ranging from one month to a month and a half without labor.

HOME AGAIN.

Mr. Redmond and his party were warmly welcomed at Dublin by the Lord Mayor and the city authorities. He addressed an enormous crowd from the steps of the Mansion House. Mr. Redmond assured the crowd that if they made their crusade to the east, menacing and dangerous enough to England, they might count upon the united support of the Irish-Americans, as well as that of the people of the United States.

CABLE NOTES.

Lord Marcus Beresford has been appointed to manage the stable of King Edward. He will devote his entire time and attention to it.

A London cable says: Lewis P. Kekewich, of the firm of Morrison, Kekewich & Co., a leading member of the Metal Exchange, died suddenly this morning. It is said that he committed suicide. The belief prevails that the deceased recently suffered heavy losses in copper.

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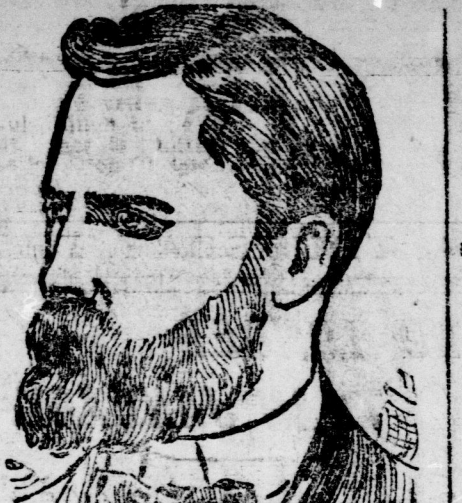

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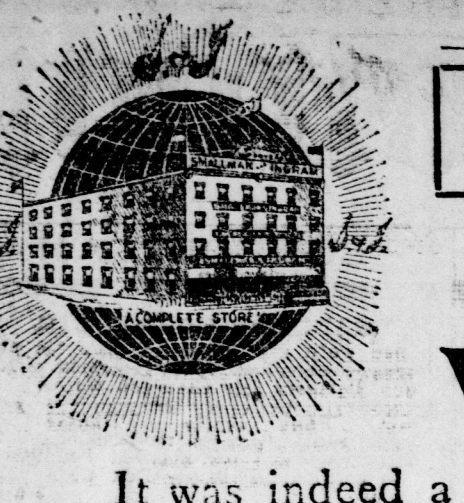
