Please find herewith inclosed a copy of the preamble being signed extensively by those who desire to become members of the Continental Reciprocity League of North America. My purpose in writing is to have the Canadian people understand perfectly the meaning of the League. To open all of North America, including Hawaii on the west, and all the islands on the east—whenever the United States to a free exchange of all the commodities which are produced within these boundaries.
The United States has a population at the present time of 75,000,000 people, consuming power is equal to that of any other 200,000,000 people on the face of the earth. Our production, therefore, is to give the Canadian producer free access to the markets of the United States, Mexico, Central America, Hawaii and the West Indies, by peaceful, lawful, honorable and generous means. Therefore, I respectfully request the preamble and this letter, that your people may fully understand the object and purpose of the Continental Reciprocity League of North America.

THE CONTINENTAL RECIPROCITY LEAGUE OF NORTH AMERICA.

We, the undersigned, advise the negotiation of treaties of Commercial Reciprocity with the Dominion of Canada, Newfoundland, the French Islands of St. Pierre, Miquelon and Langley, the Republics of Mexico, Guatemala, Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica and Panama, and British Honduras, that trade and commerce may flow freely throughout the continent of North America.
One cannot fatten his middle finger only, neither can we promote the prosperity of the States above named, without increasing that of the whole continent.
The result of such a policy is made manifest by the gain in our commerce with Porto Rico, which was valued at \$3,919,402 in 1898, and at \$22,945,311 in 1903. An increase in six years of more than 500 per cent.
We therefore unite to form the Continental Reciprocity League of North America, for the purpose of promoting commercial reciprocity with all the people of the continent, by peaceful, lawful, honorable and generous means.

COPE THEFT ENDS IN JAIL TRAGEDY

Bought by J. P. Morgan, It Causes Suicide of Suspect.

HANGS HIMSELF TO A BAR

Relic is Now on Exhibition in a British Museum and the Church is Trying to Recover It.

Ascoli, Italy, Aug. 31. — Tragedy has been added to the series of events which have followed J. Pierpont Morgan's purchase, a few months ago, of an ancient reliquary, said to have been stolen from the cathedral in this city.

The photographer, Roccighiani, who was arrested on Aug. 17 for complicity in the theft, committed suicide Monday in his cell by hanging himself to one of the bars.

The accused man had been moribund from the time of his detention, and at first tried to stave himself to death, refusing all nourishment.

Last Thursday a great sensation was caused when Mr. Santarelli, the rector of Ascoli, the parish priest of Ascoli, administrator of the seminary; Ascarano, the parish priest of Ascarano, were summoned to appear before the court which is investigating the theft of the cope.

Roccighiani had been placed under arrest the week before. His detention was caused by the fact that he had issued an illustrated postcard of the famous relic. It was discovered that the postcard was not a reproduction of any photograph taken before the theft, but a photograph of the relic itself.

It is asserted that J. Pierpont Morgan, when he bought the cope, insisted on having a photograph of the relic, and that he paid for it, to relieve him of responsibility in case of trouble. It is now testified that the photograph was really that of the man who stole the cope.

Roccighiani was a Pisan, who went to Ascoli two years ago and set up a small shop, where he recently fitted out a series of tours abroad in the most modern style, and in the order, as he says, to study the latest developments of the photographic art. He returned to Ascoli, according to his story, from Cairo, where he had been on a tour.

The stolen cope is a gem of ecclesiastical workmanship, and is almost priceless. It is a beautifully embroidered thirteenth century cope, and it was found in the cathedral at Ascoli by Pope Nicholas IV., who had it on the throne of Peter from 1288 to 1292.

It mysteriously disappeared while Roccighiani was in Ascoli, and the town was stirred to its depths.
