#### LONDON CREW AND ADAM BECK IN COLLISION AT TORONTO

Freight Engine Pulled Out On Main Line in Front of Chicago Express and Could Not Get Up Speed to Escape Being Struck-Engineer Dowling and Fireman Stevens Injured.

Toronto, Oct. 17.—Three men were silghtly hurt and four freight cars and an ergine were wrecked 100 yards south of the Dundas street bridges when C. P. R. Engine No. 854, with the Chicago-Toronto the Express, inbound at 4:09 o'clock yesterday afternoon, crashed into the rear of a shunting train of nine freight cars at that point. The cause of the wreck is said to be that the engineer of the shunting engine believed that the passenger train, which was twenty minutes late, had passed, and therefore ventured out on the main line.

Those injured were Engineer Georgs Dowling, of the passenger engine, who wrist was cut and sprained.
