

ANNUAL MEETING OF BAPTIST MISSION BOARD

Work in Chili Will Not Be Super-
vised—Report of the
Treasurer.

Toronto, Oct. 10.—It was not altogether a cheering statement that the treasurer of the Canadian Baptist foreign mission board, Rev. E. T. Fox, presented at the annual meeting yesterday. The total receipts to the end of September amounted to \$130,000, and as the appropriation for the year amounted to \$145,000 there was a deficit of \$15,000.

A petition was presented from the Baptist Union of Southern Chili asking that the board take the union under supervision. The board, however, on account of the burdens in India and Bolivia, decided to decline the application at least for the present. Hope is entertained that the Southern Baptist convention, which has work in Argentina, will take charge of the mission in Chili. It was further decided on account of the present conditions in Bulgaria, and the death of the superintendent of the Baptist work, Rev. Peter Doycheff, not to take any further steps in regard to the taking over of the Bulgarian Baptist mission.

Rev. Archibald Gordon, B. A., a graduate of McMaster, will sail from Montreal for India on the 25th of this month. He was introduced to the board. He will be supported in the field for the next seven years by the First Baptist Church of Brandon, Man.

A long discussion took place in regard to the question of accepting Government grants for the missionary schools in India. The conference mission has memorialized the board urging that on account of the peculiar character of the situation and the declared policy of the British Government in respect to mission schools, the board sanction the acceptance of the grant. After careful consideration the board voted the matter be referred back to the conference mission in India for further consideration and report.

KAISER PREACHES TEMPERANCE

German Soldiers Put On the
Water Wagon—The Emperor
Is a Crusader for Total
Abstinence.

Berlin, Sept. 18.—Wilhelm II's good warriors are grumbling because at the coming "Kaiser manoeuvres" no drinks will be served out and because every obstacle will be put in the way of warriors drinking their "honest glass of beer." All this is Wilhelm II's doing, for his Majesty—so says the official "Norddeutsche Zeitung"—is practically a teetotaler and every day frowns more fiercely on the bad thing alcohol. He even drinks toasts in water, letting his guests, if they insist on it, drink them in wine. Never at any time did Wilhelm drink much, but now he will not drink at all, or will drink only "alcohol free" drinks—which is the German name for drinks that are not drunk at all.

Wilhelm has now been nine years practically a total abstainer. He began in 1904, and his former teacher of gymnastics, Colonel V. Dresky, reported that during a long Mediterranean tour his majesty only twice "tasted" wine and this was on ceremonial occasions when his hosts forgot to put water on the table. Long before that Wilhelm forewore beer. Court Surgeon Schmidt-Metzler says that Wilhelm boasted that in ten years he had not once tasted beer, which formerly was his favorite drink.

Today Wilhelm drinks mostly Fachingen mineral water. This shows him a good businessman, for the Fachingen springs are bottled by the Prussian state. When there is no Fachingen he drinks "Roentgen" or "lemonades," which may be made out of lemons, oranges, gooseberries or other fruit. Kaiserin Augusta Victoria—so says the official "Norddeutsche"—is a demon at making lemonade. She makes it herself, pours it into acouped out pineapples and serves the pineapple in ice.

When Wilhelm's sons went to universities he forbade them to take in the great beer-drinking bouts, and in particular he forbade them to take part in "Sphinx," that is, in drinking as a penalty vast quantities of beer. This was severe of Wilhelm, for it is on record that as a student he himself drank freely though not to the point of debauch. Wilhelm's fifth son, Oskar, got into trouble at Bonn for making a somewhat braggish speech against drinking and the students laughed at him, and went and got drunk.

Wilhelm now loses no opportunity to proclaim against alcohol-consumption by students. He told the rector of Giessen University that he much regretted student drinking, and he told the student son of Architect Bodo Ebhardt that drinking is the curse of Germany's youth. Even the jovial deputation of students which came in Berlin University centenary year got a request to think more and drink less. "To start record-making as to whom can swallow the most beer," he said to the scholars of the Cassel Koenig Friedrich

Gymnasium "is a custom which belongs to quite another age."

On one of Wilhelm's latest temperance acts is to order that regimental canteens keep on tap hot tea in winter and cold tea in summer. His dislike of alcohol consumption during manoeuvres has been shown since 1910 when a test showed that soldiers who drank beer were fatigued sooner than soldiers who drank water. Since then he has steadily lectured cadets and sailors on temperance.

Wilhelm in his new abstinence propaganda is proving tolerant. Only in one quarter is he exacting. This is with his own servants. An under-gardener at Potsdam Schlos who served Wilhelm faithfully for twelve years was dismissed summarily because he was seen a bit tipsy at Wanssee. The gardener got into trouble and ended up in court, where it came out in evidence that Wilhelm II. never forgives any employee of his who gets even a wee bit drunk.

SEVEN DAUGHTERS ENOUGH. A lecture was given recently on the evil of great wealth. In the audience

was a man known to the lecturer. The man was the father of seven girls, and the lecturer pointed to him as an example. "Think," said the lecturer, "of being the proud father of seven daughters. Think who is the happier—the man with a hundred thousand pounds or the man who is the father of seven daughters."

"I will ask you, Mr. Sheldon, who do you think is the happier?" said the lecturer, pointing to the subject of his argument.

The man arose and said: "Well, sir, I think that a man with seven daughters is the happier—a man with the money worries for more; a man with seven daughters never does."
