MOONEY ALSO MADE IN SELLING TRUCKS

Auditor-General Calls Attention To Transactions For War Supplies.

COMPANY MADE \$48,625

Manager of the Selling Firm Acts As Agent For Government.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, March 29.—There was money in motor trucks bought for the first contingent. The Government paid the money. The Russell Motor Car Company got a slice of it. This company was not in a disadvantageous position, according to evidence given by the public accounts committee today. The general manager of the company was appointed to buy trucks for the Government; he bought a lot of them from his company, and paid good prices.

Bicycles and motor trucks for the first contingent were bought for the Government by T. A. Russell, general manager of the Russell Motor Car Company. He was appointed by the Government to buy trucks for them, and provided a letter from the public accounts committee appointing him. The situation is unique. T. A. Russell as general manager of the Russell Motor Car Company, as purchasing agent for the Canadian Government goods on which the profits paid to the Government by the company were \$18,625. Auditor-General Objects. The auditor-general has called the attention of the Government to the transactions.

The figures tell the tale. He bought bicycles from the Canada Cycle and Motor Company, while the same were owned by the Russell Motor Car Company. The profits of the company was \$11,000. He bought eight Russell motor trucks, and the profits of the Russell Motor Car Company over and above what it would have had if it had sold to the Government were \$5,600. The Russell Motor Car Company had some agencies. As agents, they made substantial profits from the Canadian people. Their profits on 25 Jeffrey motor trucks totaled \$15,500. Their profits on accessories totaled \$5,600. Their profits on twelve tractors totaled \$2,400.

After the examination, Chairman Moray congratulated the witness on the showing he had made. Major Owen Thomas swore that he had purchased motor transports for the second contingent, and had saved the Government \$18,000 compared with the prices paid by Mr. Russell for motor transports, for the first contingent. For the second contingent, Kelly trucks were bought at factory prices, which are considerably below those Mr. Russell paid his firm for the same trucks. Mr. Russell was formerly secretary of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association. He was one of the eighteen who lost the Liberal party in the last election.

There was some conscience money paid in connection with the motor transports obtained for the first contingent. The tires for the vehicles were bought separately. Fancy prices prevailed until they reached the auditor-general. After the showing was made, it was found that there was a repayment on account of tires to the amount of over \$5,000.

GERMANS TO ATTACK COAST OF FINLAND

[Canadian Press.] LONDON, March 30.—3:39 a.m.—German naval activities have been resumed in the Baltic Sea and the Gulf of Bothnia with the intention of carrying out a blockade campaign against the trade of Finland and Sweden, according to a Copenhagen dispatch to the Daily News. The correspondent declares attacks on the Finnish coast are being made by German submarines. German submarines have been reported not far off shore. A German fleet has been observed south of the Aland Islands. Danish and Swedish vessels are reported to have been halted by German submarines, but so far as known only one was fired upon and she escaped unharmed.

WASTE OF MONEY IN COMPENSATION BOARD

San Carter, M.P.P. Criticises Appointments in Parliament.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, March 29.—Mr. Carter (S. Wellington) spoke something of a surprise to the Government, when he openly criticized the appointments to the Workmen's Compensation Board today. He thought \$5,000 a year could have been saved in salaries and objected to the vice-chairman, a man of 68, getting \$8,500 a year. He was "too old to learn a new business," and the appointment was an outrage, he contended. The Premier replied that the vice-chairman was a man of wide experience and great ability in labor matters. Mr. Rowell pointed out defects in the act. The board had now invested some \$700,000 belonging to the manufacturers, which it had collected on the capitalized basis. If the current cost system had been followed the workman could have been protected and the money left in the hands of the employers. He also urged the adoption of a first aid provision.

NO MORE SENATORS UNTIL AFTER ELECTION

OTTAWA, March 29.—In the Senate today on the Government's proposal to increase the Senate membership to 104 by bringing the same amendment as last year, that the increase in membership not take effect until the next general election, or at the same time as the common redistribution comes into effect. The amendment was carried by 27 to 16. The tariff resolution was reported from committee without amendment, and the \$100,000,000 war appropriation bill was given second reading.

German Offensive West of Niemen Is Stopped

Petrograd Announces That Enemy's Siege Batteries At Ossowetz Have Nearly Ceased Fire—More Progress In Carpathians.

[Canadian Press.] PETROGRAD, March 29 (via London, March 30)—12:30 a.m.—The following official statement from general headquarters was issued tonight: "On the front, west of the Niemen, we have everywhere stopped the German counter-offensive. A battalion of the 21st German corps, which was advancing, Sunday, over the ice on Lake Dusia, with the object of getting in our rear, was attacked with the bayonet, near the village of Zebrisk, and annihilated. The enemy's siege batteries at Ossowetz have almost entirely ceased fire. Fighting continues between the Skwa and Orzye Rivers. In an extremely desperate battle for the village of Vakh, we captured nine machine guns.

"In the Carpathians, between Morlitz and Bartfeld, the Austrians, on Saturday, made persistent but fruitless attacks near the villages of Gladychoff and Rughetow. In the direction of Balligrod, on the left bank of the upper San, in the sector of Radzieitow, Polanka, Zavy and Javoritz, we made progress, and have taken more than 600 prisoners and four machine guns. Near Kozioiwka, on Saturday, we repulsed new German attacks."

SOUTH PERTH LIBS. TO MEET APRIL 9

Officers will be elected for the ensuing year and a candidate will be chosen to make a run for a seat in the Dominion House. F. F. Dardie, Esq., M.P., will be present to address the convention.

Canadians Are Relieved And All Have Done Nobly

[Canadian Press.] OTTAWA, March 29.—Major-General Hughes said, in Parliament today, that he had just been informed by the British authorities that the Canadians had been relieved in the trenches and that the commander of the forces had expressed the opinion that they had done nobly.

GREAT PARIS FAIR TO OUST LEIPZIG

French Associations Plan a Move To Capture Some of Germany's Trade.

[Canadian Press.] Paris, March 29.—The city council has decided to organize, with the co-operation of the principal commercial and industrial associations of France, a great Paris fair to take the place hitherto held in international trade by the celebrated Leipzig Exposition in Germany. This is designed as a step in the direction of obtaining for France and her allies trade which hitherto has gone to Germany.

TURKEY OFFERING BRIBE TO BULGARIA

Dispatch Says Territory Will Be Given For Continued Neutrality.

[Canadian Press.] Paris, March 30.—The Athens correspondent of the Hays agency declares he has received from diplomatic sources confirmation of the report that Field Marshal Der Goltz has been authorized by Turkey to offer Bulgaria the Enos-Midia line as a new boundary in exchange for her continued neutrality.

The first intimation that territorial concessions had been offered to Bulgaria by Turkey was contained in a dispatch from Sofia to the Exchange Telegraph Company at London on March 27. The territory involved includes Adrianople, Kirk-Kilissah and other important towns.

HOLDING UP GUNS. [Canadian Press.] Geneva, March 30.—Dispatches received here from Sofia state that Bulgaria is holding up shipments of German artillery and large quantities of ammunition destined for Constantinople. Many German officers travelling to and from Turkey, some of them wounded, are awaiting passports at Sofia to enter Austria.

BERLIN SAYS BUSINESS FAIRLY SATISFACTORY

Shortage of Men Laborers In Industries—Women Seek Employment.

[Canadian Press.] Berlin, March 30.—Via London, 11:21 a.m.—The business situation in Germany is regarded as fairly satisfactory, and considerably better than might have been expected in view of the war. Industries, of course, are running on a restricted scale, chiefly because of the virtual cessation of overseas exports, but as a large proportion of the skilled workmen went into the army the sharp curtailment in production was not attended by a corresponding increase in unemployment.

Women Want Work. More women and girls are seeking work in some branches of industry than in others, but this is far from being the case with the men. On the contrary the leading industries of the country are seriously embarrassed by the scarcity of male workmen. This is true of the coal and iron trade, ship building and certain sections of the chemical industry.

A pronounced scarcity of workmen is reported from the great industrial district about Essen. The demand for coal is greater than the mines can meet, although its export has been prohibited. The production of pig iron is running about 55 per cent of last year's would be still larger if the necessary labor could be obtained. Many branches of machinery manufacture are important branches of German industrial activity, are working full time or overtime, but here also a scarcity of workmen is felt.

Textile factories engaged in turning out the cheaper lines of goods are hampered by a shortage of raw material. The woolen trade is in great demand for the making of shoddy. Some mills have taken to producing shoddy yarns. Inadequate receipts of cotton have raised the prices of cotton yarns and cloths.

MRE. BORDEN TO BE BURIED ON WEDNESDAY

Funeral Will Take Place at Grand Pre, Where Husband Lies.

[Canadian Press.] Halifax, N. S., March 30.—The funeral of Mrs. Borden will take place at Grand Pre on Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The body will be taken to rest in the old Presbyterian funeral ground at Grand Pre, where lies her husband, who died exactly fifteen years ago on Sunday.

A special train will leave Halifax on Wednesday morning, with a delegation from this city, who desire to be present at the funeral. Many floral offerings have been sent to Grand Pre, among them one from the Halifax Conservative Association, and another from the Conservative members in the Nova Scotia House of Assembly.

Sir Robert Borden plans to return to Canada on Wednesday evening or Thursday morning.

DROPPED BOMBS ON WARSHIP

Constantinople, Via London, March 30.—10:25 a.m.—An official statement issued today by the war office says: "One of our aeroplanes has dropped bombs on a British warship cruising outside the Dardanelles."

GERMAN SOCIALISTS EXPECT THEIR REWARD

[Canadian Press.] London, March 30.—As a result of German Socialists' staunch support of the Government in the war party, leaders confidently expect the future will bring to them the rewards of their loyalty. A resolution expressing this belief was adopted by the Socialist party diet at Halle, according to a dispatch from the Reuters Telegram Company by way of Amsterdam. The resolution added that, while safeguarding all party principles, Socialists will vote for the adoption of the budget to show the world that Germany is united in its effort to gain a victory and lasting peace.

Has Begun Seeding

Saskatchewan Farmer Sows Ten Acres of Wheat. [Canadian Press.] Saskatoon, March 30.—S. A. Mitchell, a farmer near here, has seeded ten acres to wheat and has five acres ready for seeding oats.

NEARLY \$100,000,000 FOR THE WAR THIS YEAR

Canada's Expenses Estimated to Almost Reach This Amount. OTTAWA, March 29.—Hon. J. D. Hazen, in the Commons today, announced that Canada's naval expenditure from the outbreak of the war to February 1 was \$2,091,000, and the estimated expenditure for February and March, \$700,000. Estimates for the next twelve months were \$3,600,000. Mal-tien Huchest estimated the war expenditure during the coming financial year at \$5,475,000.

"DESIRABLE PROPERTY" SAID TO BE IN FOREST

Offices of Land Syndicate Raided, and Officials Arrested. [Canadian Press.] Calgary, March 30.—Police raided the office of the Farmholdings Syndicate here and arrested Gilbert Green and Alex.
