Feb. 4 .- A fifth ballot for the election of a successor to Pope Benedict was taken by the conclave of the Sacred College this morning but without resudt, no candidate receiving a sufficient number of votes. Smoke began to appear from the chimney of the Sistine Chapel shortbefore 12 o'clock. Expectant crowds watched eagerly from the moment the first wisps showed them-selves but the smoke cloud at once began to assume the tell-tale dark color which indicated that there had been no final chaice by the Sacred
