A party of police officers wended their way to a farm at Medina on the Indian Reserve, to seize a farm or eject the occupant, when a "free-for-all" started.

the officers found themselves greatly outnumbered. They wielded their clubs with good effect, however, and gave as much as or more than they took. Finally more and more Indians kept arriving, and eventually the officers decided to leave the scene of the conflict and return with reinforcements.

Speaking about the affray, High Constable Kerr explained that trouble on the reserve had been brewing for some time past. Shortly after the war the Dominion Government had purchased several farms for returned Indian soldiers under the soldiers' civil re-establishment scheme. One of these, the Hill farm, was settled on by an overseas Indian, who failed to keep up his payments, and the farm was subsequently sold by the govern-




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
