

MARINER RELATES TRIP TO AFRICA

Port Stanley Club Hears of
Stirring Adventures From
Capt. Berry.

COFFEE WAS CHEAP

At the weekly meeting of the men's club of Christ church, Port Stanley, which was held last evening in the parish rooms, Captain Mark Berry, an old mariner who has sailed the seven seas, related many of his adventures.

The captain told of how in 1864 he decided to take an adventure trip, going first from Port Stanley to New York.

The first landing they made was at one of the Cape Verde islands, where they stayed for three days inspecting the huge mountain and the extinct volcano at its summit.

Their next stop was at the Isle of St. Thomas, where they put in for three weeks, buying coffee from the natives for less than five cents a bushel. The inhabitants would remain out on the mountainside all day picking the coffee for this trifle in money.

Fruit was plentiful on the island, but none of the crew appeared to have any cash. This difficulty was soon solved when the captain, who could talk thirty different languages, saw a gold dollar hanging from Captain Berry's watch chain.

They exchanged this dollar for the native money, and after buying fruit and vegetables from the natives Berry still had 25 cents left when he arrived in New York.

While on another island in the Pacific, smallpox broke out among the natives and by some misfortune it spread to the ship. The captain and mate and many of the crew died from the effects, and Captain Berry and the interpreter were left as captain and mate, respectively.

A British warship that happened to be in the harbor made arrangements with the Portuguese government whereby natives could be used to man the ship on the return journey to America.

They arrived at last in New York after being away for over two years. The cargo was unloaded and the ivory, which was purchased for not more than seven cents a tusk, was sold.

The captain was asked to make another trip to Africa, but refused, saying that he had seen enough of that country.

GRAHAM McDONALD SHOWS LITTLE CHANGE

The condition of Graham McDonald of Middlemiss, who was brought to Victoria hospital Monday morning, suffering from a double fracture to the jaw and a fractured skull, as the result of a motor accident, remains critical and no change for the better is reported by hospital authorities.

Shortly after the accident it was reported that accessories on Mr. McDonald's car had been stolen. It was later learned, however, that the accessories had been taken from the car by residents nearby the scene of the accident, to guard against a possible theft.

Toronto Asks Another Vote

Toronto, Nov. 5.—Toronto may get a chance to vote on the question of local option in the sale of liquor under government control. It is likely that at the next meeting of the city council a motion will be made to submit a question of the subject to the electors by way of a referendum on January 1. The outcome of the voting, of course, would have no other effect than to show the government the attitude of the city in the matter of allowing individual municipalities to vote themselves out of the Ontario temperance act.

ORGANIZE LONDON RELIEF CIRCLE

Society to Relieve Conditions
Among Unemployed Comes
Into Being Here.

Taking as its reason for existence the conditions which prevail on account of unemployment, an important new organization came into being last night. This organization to be known as the unemployment sunshine relief circle, has for its slogan "Sunshine in every home in London."

Coming as the result of strenuous work during the past few months by members of the London women's labor party, instigated in this action by Mrs. John Crawford, the organization now has the backing of the mayor, and is recognized by him as supplementary to the work of the city relief office.

Mrs. John Crawford was elected president at a meeting held last night for organization purposes. She is supported by a strong executive, including: Hon. president, Mrs. W. J. Carson; vice-president, Mrs. Floyd Wells; executive treasurer, Mrs. A. T. Edwards; assistant treasurer, Mrs. George Shibley; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Wendell Holmes; recording secretary, Mrs. Alex. Gilmore; field secretary, Mrs. Fred White; mothers' councilors, Mrs. W. A. Tanner, Mrs. D. C. McNaughton, Mrs. Ida Harrison and Mrs. A. Lucas.

A call is being sent out from this organization to every woman's organization in London, asking their co-operation in this work which the new relief circle is undertaking. It is the aim of the executive to make the circle cover the whole city in membership and activity. An opportunity for studying the world-wide problem of unemployment, will be given through the citizenship committee of the local council of women.

Not only is the club membership open to women, but an associate membership is extended to the men of the city. And on the request of one of the aldermen provision has been made for home circles in connection with this organization, through which the children of the community may become interested in the work.

The close association of the members of the Women's labor party with the unemployed of the city has opened their eyes to conditions as they exist. This was followed up this summer by an energetic study of labor problems by the direction of Mrs. John Crawford.

CHAMBER SEEKS MORE MEMBERS

ADDRESSED BY DEAN**

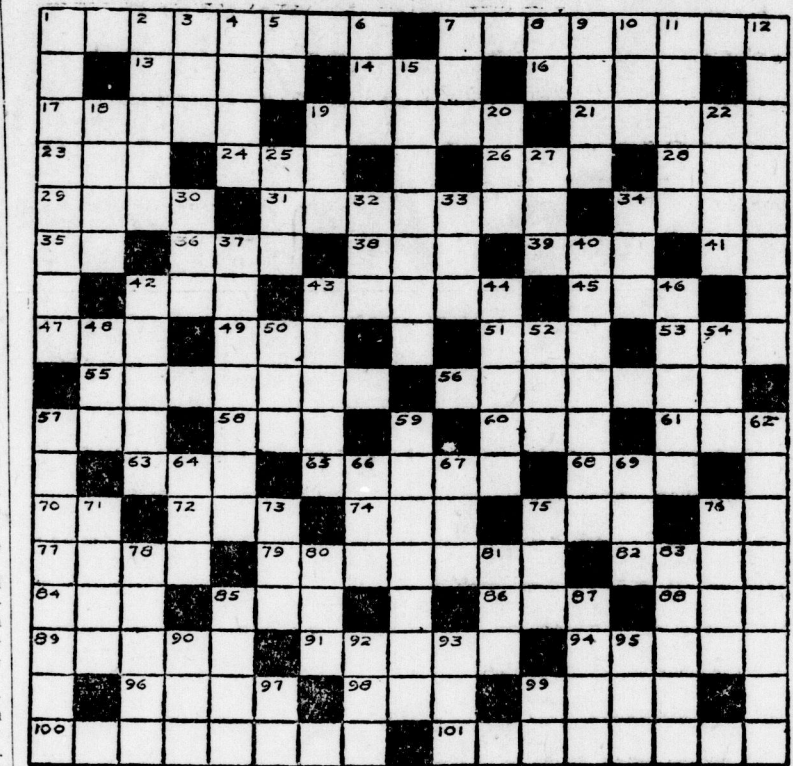
