## **SOLICITOR** SALES PLAN

Official Rules That Housing Board Transgressed On Commission Method.

MATTER FOR COURTS

New Attempt To Sell City's Houses May Be Balked by Meredith Finding.

Municipal circles are reported shaken today by receipt of the official opinion of City Solicitor T. G. Meredith, K.C., that the London housing commission, which has already paid out about \$5,000 in commissions on the sale of houses and lots, has done so without legal au-

The city solicitor's ruling is being withheld from the public, but The Advertiser is informed on reliable authority that it has created a most unusual situation and one that is likely to have an echo in the courts, in a suit to recover all funds, so dis-persed, even if it is necessary to sue

the commissioners themselves. The difficulty arises from the fact that the housing legislation originally enacted by the legislature contemplated no such wholesale speculative onstruction as was later undertaken in London. The act was intended to finance home building, either by or on behalf of responsible people, who were expected to make applications in their own behalf. Later, however, the city purchased large tracts of land in Ealing and South London, and em-barked on a wholesale construction program, anticipating a demand that did not develop. In order to upload the remaining houses the commission at length engaged John W. Cunliffe as manager, and during his tenure paid him about \$4,400, of which about \$2,400 was in commissions on the ale of 21 houses and 14 lots. 21 houses included the re-sale of six which came back on the city's hands.

Recently the commission decided to make a new attempt to sell the houses on commission, after releasing Mr. Cunliffe from his duties on the first of May, but the city soli-citor has ruled that the city has no power to spend any funds for such no power to spend any tunes for service, and power can only be obtained by applying at the next session of the legislature for some enactment amending the present prohibitory clauses in two acts which are cited as covering housing opera-
