A modern abattoir, with cold storage facilities can be erected for \$30,000 or less and made self-sustaining from the first year.

The plan provides for one inspector at \$1000 per annum and three butchers at a cost of \$2000 per year. The other expenditures named would be coal \$600, power \$600; oil, amonia and insurance \$300; and debenture interest and principal \$2407.

26. Total cost annual \$6307.

The receipts from the abattoir are estimated at \$7750, leaving a surplus of \$843.

It will not be sought to make any considerable profit from the utility. As the city grows, the cost of inspection and slaughtering will be lowered.

In addition, the Board of Health has an assurance that the Dominion Government will make a grant of \$4800 towards the cost of the cold storage part of the undertaking. The Board will endeavor to erect this municipal abattor at a less cost than estimated. It will apply the \$4800 to reducing the amount of debentures called for and only issue as much of the stipulated amount as is necessary.

Now, let us consider some of the objections raised. A few fear that a municipal abattoir might raise the cost of meat. On the contrary it should be lessened if anything, since, with all work of preparing meat ready for distribution to the ronsumer, carried on under one root and having cold storage facilities at hand, it can be done at a lower cost for fourteen than one butcher could do it for himself.

Others ask: Weuld the abattoir rules prevent farmers from selling meat at the market? Answer: No. The Board of Health will allow them to self as they are now doing believing that it would be only a very short time before the farmers would bring their live stock to the abattoir to have it inspected, slaughtered and stamped as abattoir meat. It is expected that the public, when it learned by experience that abattoir, meat was just as theap and guaranteed to be healthy and sound, would want none other.
