Farmers Are Urged to Greater Interest in Industry

The encouraging remarks the great possibilities of the country in British Columbia by the Earl Grey, as reported by the Colonist the other day, the subject of discussion of the province and there is manifested an increase in what some day promises the greatest factor in the development of this great country.

The Nanaimo Free Press says the farmers of the island to fruit growing to a greater extent at present. It says:

"There is not a fruit grower on the island who does not claim that cannot be raised in this country. The experience of the fruit grower in the upper country has been to find that there is ample room for every pound of fruit grown in the known as the Northwest, and the assurance of Maxwell S. Smith, a Dominion Inspector at Vancouver, that the people of Vancouver Island can plant enough trees in the next few years to raise fruit enough to amply supply this rapidly growing market."

"Granted that that there is no demand than supply, and that the fruit grown in this section as regards apples is all that can be desired to it, it would seem that in a few years the fruit growing industry will assume large proportions and add to the revenue of Nanaimo considerably."

"Beyond a few local sales, the fruit growers in the district have attempted to place their produce on the outside market and in consequence see tons and tons of fruit rotting in the fields."
